

Rossellini, Bergman Let Hair Down

NEW YORK, Dec. 16 (AP)—The New York Times in a Rome dispatch yesterday said Film Star Ingrid Bergman had told its correspondent "some difficulties" had prevented her getting a divorce from Dr. Peter Lindstrom.

Times Correspondent Camille M. Cienfuegos wrote that Miss Bergman told him she planned to marry Italian Film Director Roberto Rossellini as soon as she is free, having decided "to give up my artist's career because I now want to live my own life just as any other woman."

Cienfuegos said he interviewed Miss Bergman and Rossellini in her apartment in Rome. The couple's romance began last spring when Rossellini directed the Swedish actress in the film "Stromboli," made on a bleak, volcanic island off Italy's West coast.

Explanation

According to the Times dispatch, Rossellini said Miss Bergman "explained things quite clearly" to Dr. Lindstrom when they met in Messina last May, at a time when the Bergman-Rossellini romance was making headlines around the world.

"I want to make it clear," the Times account of Rossellini's remarks continued, "that at that time the relationship between Ingrid and myself was absolutely correct. It is not our fault, it is, if we cannot get married because Ingrid has been unable so far to obtain a divorce."

Concerning published reports that Miss Bergman is going to have a baby in February, the Times quoted Rossellini as saying:

"Whether she is or is not is nobody's affair. I think that report deserves neither denial nor confirmation because it is an attempt to pry into the private life of a woman who, to assert her right to her own life, has given up her career—which is what an artist regards as the most important thing in life. Isn't that enough?"

"By making that decision hasn't Ingrid as good as said to both her admirers and detractors: 'Look, I have fallen in love with a man who is not my husband. As an artist I have a certain responsibility toward the public and I may be criticized. All right, if that's the case, I no longer want to be an artist. I want to be a happy wife with the man I love.'"

Attributes Bring Flood Of Answers

GETTYSBURG, S. D., Dec. 16 (AP)—Ile Dertmowaska of Hamburg, Germany can have her pick from some 60 prospective husbands in the Midwest.

The 28-year-old German woman wrote a letter recently to Mayor Walter Sundergard of Gettysburg saying she was lonely and wanted "a good American husband." She described herself as "endowed with a bosom like Jane Russell and legs like Betty Grable." The mayor wrote the letter to some newsmen.

Answer Flood

The answering epistles came in from North Dakota, Wyoming, Iowa, Nebraska and Minnesota. They are still arriving daily although the mayor has long since disclaimed running a "lonely hearts" agency.

One 36-year-old farmer drove 400 miles to get first hand information about Ile from the mayor. The man said his mother prompted the trip by suggesting he should "pick out a good German girl for a wife."

Lacking a stenographer, Sundergard said he was bundling up the letters as they arrived and forwarding them to Ile for her personal attention. With a touch of local pride he reported no men in this Central South Dakota community of 1000 population have applied yet for Ile's hand.

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Portland Broker's Jury Selected

PORTLAND, Dec. 16 (AP)—A jury was selected Wednesday for the trial of Arnold E. Johnson, 59, broker accused of embezzlement of the funds of five clients. Judge Alfred P. Dobson ordered the trial to begin Friday.

Johnson is accused of larceny by embezzlement of \$1125 from Ella Lawrence on March 11, 1947. Four other indictments accuse the defendant and the late Roy Johnson, a brother, of taking funds from other accounts.

The brother was found dead in an automobile near Gladstone earlier this year. The car had been set afire.

Charged with operating a gambling establishment was Frank Caldwell, 40, whose address was listed as Milwaukie.

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Gambling Raid Nets 15

McMINNVILLE, Dec. 16 (AP)—A gambling raid by city, county and state police netted three Portlanders and 12 players at an elaborate equipped room north of this city.

State Police Sgt. William Roach said two men and the wife of one were free on \$50 bail each. Ten of the 12 players were later released.

Charged with operating a gambling game were George Henry Carr, 50, and his wife, Louise, 35.

Salable Timber Tracts Listed

PORTLAND, Dec. 16 (AP)—Oregon-California agency timber tracts for sale during 1950 were listed today to permit buyers to plan the year's logging operations.

Daniel L. Goldy, regional administrator of the bureau of land management, said the tracts hold 467,000,000 board feet for harvesting. The advance listings were recommended by the O & C advisory board.

The largest block is 107,000,000 board feet in the Coos Bay district. The others: Roseburg —92,000,000; Medford—100,000,000; Salem —80,000,000.
