Off Deck, Gilman KOs
Ralph Weiser in Third

Spokane lightweight Buddy Gilman took a long stride up the fisticuff trail at the armory last night.

It wasn't merely that he KO'd rugged Ralph Weiser, Beatty Indian, mid-way of the third round; it was the way he did it.

In one and one-half rounds, Gilman absorbed four crushing knockdowns from Weiser, any one of which would have easily rocked a fair-to-middlin' fighter to sleep. But the blows didn't appear to hurt more than nettle Gilman.

And when Gilman came up from the fourth knockdown, midway in the second frame, he took complete

charge of the fight. He swarmed into Weiser with a fury that plainly disheartened the Indian. Weiser's blows lost their snap and became floundering round-housers.

Then, early in the third, Gilman nailed the Indian with a rapid-fire one-two that sent Weiser sagging to the canvas. Weiser made it up on the nine count, but Gilman quickly chased him into a corner and put him away for keeps.

The result was the more amazing because Weiser appeared to have at least a 12 or 15 pound weight advantage. (Actual weights were not announced.)

Weiser fought a good fight, prob-

ably as good as he ever fought, but he was up against a lad that bids to go far and could go all the way. Gilman's veteran trainer and handler, Al Hendricks, was jubilant after the fight.

"The boy's really coming along," Hendricks beamed, "and he's going far."

Coming from Hendricks, those are weighty words because the elderly Negro has worked with several champions, dating back to Heavyweight Champ Jack Johnson.

In the dressing room after the fight, Hendricks said he planned to take Gilman to Honolulu soon after the first of the year. A little more polishing under the healthy Cuban sun and he figures to have Gilman ready for an advance on the Big Stem.

Last night's semi-final proved exactly nothing as Merrill's George Price and Medford's Johnny Bruce fought to their second draw in two meetings.

As in their first tussle, Price piled up points with his snaky left but Bruce evened the score in the last round with some lusty blows.

Klamath Falls' George Malone suffered a larruping KO at the hands of big Jack Ellis, Ellis, a Spokane stablemate of Gilman's, stalked the shifty Malone for two and one-third rounds before he found his opening. Malone led with a left and Ellis ripped over a murderous right cross for the pay-off.

In two four-round preliminaries, Puppy Jackson, Beatty, scored a TKO over Corky Gibbons, and Sam Walker, Merrill, and Richard Dickens, Chiloquin, fought to a draw.

The more loyal Ram backers refuse to concede an Eagle victory, however. They've seen the club beat the mighty Chicago Bears twice this season, which is the same club that handed the Eagles their single setback in the one time they met.

They discount Philadelphia's win over Los Angeles on the grounds that it came when the club was due for a letdown after winning six straight games.

As for individual personnel, the Rams can point to three stalwarts who were named on the Associated Press all-pro team, and one more that missed it by an eyelash.

The three are Quarterback Bob Waterfield, Center Freddie Nauvets and Tackle Dick Huffman. The second team choice was the league's leading and now new record holder in pass catching, Left End Tommy Fears.

Philadelphia, of course, boasts two all-pro stars in Left Halfback Steve Van Buren and End Pete Pihos, and such contenders for top honors as Quarterback Tommy Thompson, Halfback Bosh Pritchard, Center Vic Lindskog, Tackle Al Wistert and other superb performers.

Contrary to widespread belief, the listed weights give the Rams a slight edge in poundage—222 to 221 in the line, 197½ to 191 in the starting backfield and a team average of 221 to 210.

The Pelicans made their best mark of the early basketball season last night and downed the Roseburg high Chiefs 53-34 going away in the first of a two-game series on Pelican court.

Second game of the set will be played tonight at 8:15. A preliminary between the Klamath Jayvees and Hal's Sports of the city league begins at 7 o'clock.

Last night's victory raised the Pel average for the season to the 500 point—three wins and three losses. For Roseburg it was the third straight setback.

The Pel's led from the very first seconds of play when Bill Toole latched onto a loose ball at mid-court and raced in for a lay-in basket, except for a brief moment when a Roseburg flurry tied the score at 9-9. Toole again came in for a fast basket and the lead was never again breached or seriously threatened.

By halftime Klamath held a 25-15 margin and 13 of the points had been made by Forward Tom Schubert.

In a couple of minutes of the third period Schubert dropped in two more baskets to make his evening's point total 17, a new individual high among the Pels this season.

Reserves played most of the third and all of the fourth periods for the Pels. Roseburg substituted freely also and a total of 26 players saw action at one time or another.

Guard Dexter Garey, who was not in the starting lineup, was the big gun for the Tribe. He scored a dozen points and was a particularly peppy ball hawk. Center Frank Olson and Guard Ker Briggs followed Garey with five points each.

A preliminary game between the Jayvees and Weyerhaeuser of the city league provided a good measure of thrills for the small crowd.

Weyerhaeuser overcoming a 15-point shortage at halftime to eke out a 42-39 win.
