

Power Unit At Tokete Dedicated

Formal dedication of the Tokete Falls power plant on the North Umpqua river, first plant of a five-year \$500,000 building program of the California Oregon Power company, was held in Roseburg Thursday evening with a number from Klamath Falls attending.

Dedication ceremonies were headed by Governor Douglas McKay, Representative Harris Kilworth, Donnellville Administrator Paul J. Raver, Albert S. Cummins, president of the company, made the dedication address and Gov. McKay made the formal acceptance of the new plant in behalf of the people of Oregon.

The Tokete Falls plant itself will add 42,500 kilowatts to the Copco system's capacity. The eight plants which comprise the North Umpqua project will add a total of 145,000 kilowatts by completion of construction in 1953. This will more than double the prewar capacity of the system.

In his dedication address, Cummins linked the increased demand for power to the increases in both industry and population in the area, and predicted that by 1953 the increase in power capacity will have been substantially absorbed by the greater demand.

Governor McKay pointed to the company's construction program as an indication of how the Southern Oregon area is growing, and made a strong plea for the interest of all citizens of the state in achieving a balanced growth, with the wise use of natural resources. The governor paid tribute to the company's record of public service in the area and faith in the future growth of the region as reflected by the program.

Dr. Raver emphasized the conservation of other forms of fuel and energy made possible by the continued development of hydroelectric energy in the Northwest, and the results to be obtained by coordination of power projects.

The California Oregon Power company serves approximately 75,000 customers in Southern Oregon and Northern California, with headquarters at Medford.

Norblad Puts Blast On Red Activity

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—A Oregon congressman said last night that every communist advance in the Far East increases the danger to the "inadequately defended" Pacific Northwest and Alaska.

Rep. Norblad (R-Ore) then announced that all members of the Oregon and Washington congressional delegation and the delegate from Alaska will hold a non-partisan meeting next month in an effort to work out a new defense plan for the area.

In his appearance on a radio (Mutual) news program, Norblad said the security of the Northwest should be of equal concern to all parts of the country.

He cited government plans to move industries inland from the Northwest, then asked: "But what of the people who live there? What can we do to protect them?"

Next month's meeting, he said, will attempt to answer those questions.

Marvin Williams Death Learned

Word has been received here of the death of Marvin Williams, longtime resident of Klamath and Lake counties, in Santa Cruz, Calif., where he had lived for the past 17 years. At the time of his death he was nearly 85 years old. His wife, Mollie B. Williams, and son Marvin Williams Jr., survive.

Williams was retired from the U. S. forest service in Oregon and had served as ranger on the Klamath Indian reservation.

Joseph Kuney, 18, died in St. Vincent hospital about 4:15 a. m. of injuries received in the blast. Kuney was one of seven persons who were on the critical list of injured at two hospitals. He was employed in the loading department at the plant.

The loading department and the offices and salesrooms received the full force of the explosion.

Partial operations were to be resumed today in slaughtering departments which had only minor damage.

Coal Gas Takes Life Of Five

SCRANTON, Pa., Dec. 17 (AP)—Deadly coal gas seeped through a small home undetected yesterday killing a 29-year-old mother and her four children, aged five months to six years.

Police described it as the worst single family tragedy in Scranton history. Dead were Mrs. John Simon, a French war bride, and her children, Michael, 6; Francis Louis, 3; Jacqueline, 1; and Teddy, five months.

Jacqueline was to have celebrated

her second birthday Monday. The bodies were found by the husband and father when he returned from work.

Dr. Paul E. Kubasko, Lackawanna county coroner, said coal gas escaped from a defective choker in the basement of the home. The victims were asphyxiated.

The mother was found in bed with her two daughters. Michael was in another room and the infant in a third room.
