Northern PCC Cagers Slate Hustling Week

Oregon State Has Pair of Scraps With Indiana U

It's a big week for northern division, coast conference, basketball squads with no less than 15 games against major college competition on the schedule before Santa Claus makes his week-end journey.

The touring Idaho Vandals and Washington State college Cougars will be the most active. Each will play four games. Washington has three contests billed, Oregon and Oregon State each have two.

Oregon State, which dropped a 51-42 tilt to Utah Saturday night, and Washington State, a 56-44 winner over Buffalo university, both see action tonight. OSC takes on Indiana's big 10 quintet in the first of two tilts, and the all-winning Cougars move into Madison Square Garden against perennially powerful St. John's.

The rest of the week's schedule includes:

Tuesday—Idaho vs. Iowa State at Ames; Oregon vs. Stanford at Eugene; Oregon State vs. Indiana at Corvallis; Washington vs. Minnesota at Seattle; Washington State vs. Bradley at Peoria, Ill.

Thursday—Idaho vs. Morningside at Sioux City, Ia.; Washington State vs. Kansas State at Manhattan, Kan.

Friday—Idaho vs. Nebraska at Lincoln, Neb.; Washington vs. Stanford at Seattle; Washington State vs. Wyoming at Laramie, Wyo.

Washington Cougars kept pace with the Washington Huskies in the win column, each with six triumphs and no defeats. The Huskies marked up No. 6 Saturday at the expense of the independent Alpine Dairy five by the low score of 38-30.

Pacific Lutheran also marked up its sixth straight win with a 45-32 decision over Pacific university. In other games, Olympic junior college of Bremerton became the third consecutive victim of the touring Tyler, Tex. Jaycees by an 83-65 count; Nevada successfully invaded Portland university 65-54; Vanport turned back Menlo Park, Calif., 57-42; Linfield dumped Laverne 56-32; Eastern Washington blasted Whitman 67-48; Western Washington eked past Seattle Pacific 66-64; Seattle university got back on the win side with a 78-61 win over St. Martin's; and Southern Oregon lopped Eastern Oregon 66-52.

The second score came four minutes after the third quarter started. The Rams were on their 10, set back by a holding penalty, when End Leo Skladany broke through to block Bob Waterfield's punt, pick up the ball on the three and trot across. A high pass from center was a contributing factor. Cliff Patton converted both scores.

The Rams threatened only once, and that was nullified by an interception. The Eagles lost a third chance when Jim Farmer fumbled on the seven.

So bad was the weather that the managements of both eastern and western division winners were willing to postpone the playoff until Christmas. But Commissioner Bell, in his home in Philadelphia, said no.

The downpour was so steady that even two layers of tarpaulin didn't keep the turf dry. Showers pelted the spectators through most of the game.

Although he didn't figure in either of the scores, Van Buren, the Eagles' all-pro back, gave as great a running exhibition as the coliseum has seen.

The one-time Louisiana State star carried the ball 31 times for a net 196 yards, breaking the single-game record of 159 yards in 19 tries set by Elmer Angsman when his Chicago Cardinals beat Philadelphia for the title in the 1947 playoff.

The Rams didn't make a single first down from a running play. They gained only 48 yards all day on the ground, and lost 27 to that Eagle line.

Her son, Lendol, happily cried: "I'm glad mummy won."

Longden, national champion jockey in 1938-47-48, refused to go to the steward's stand for unsavory and pictures.

He would make no comment. Acquaintances quoted him as saying he would like to race her again.

Mrs. Davis, wife of Horse Trainer L. D. Davis of Redlands, Calif., rode 3-year-old Redlands over six furlongs in 1:12. Longden, aboard Grey Spook, was a length and three-quarters behind.

There was no betting.

Joe Louis Cagey On Intention

OAKLAND, Calif., Dec. 19 (AP)—Joe Louis, retired heavyweight champion who keeps insisting he will remain in that category, dons the gloves for a scheduled 10-round match here tonight.

His opponent will be Al Hosman, a Los Angeles Negro who stands 6 feet 5 inches and weighs some 200 pounds. Hosman once was a sparring partner of Louis.

Whether the fight will go the distance is problematical. Louis is expected to level with the best punches from the start. Hosman is fast and a good boxer. Eight ounce gloves will be used.

Louis, on an exhibition tour, has been hitting like he meant it. Louis' avowed intention to remain in retirement has been greeted with skepticism around here. Says Dolph Thomas, proprietor of a San Francisco gymnasium where the undefeated champ trained:

"I'd like to bet that Louis fights Charles next summer. Joe is still the best of them all. He trains like he means business. I believe he is getting ready for a comeback."

Marshall Miles, manager of Louis, said:

"Louis told a newspaperman that he thought he had 'one more good fight in his system.' I think the same as Joe but so far he has no plans to make a comeback."

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Browns Will Have Heads Examined

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 19 (AP)—The owners of the St. Louis Browns, willing to try anything to improve the club's position, have come up with a psychologist.

He is Dr. David F. Tracy of New York—author, lecturer and specialist in psychological problems.

Dr. Tracy convinced President Bill Dewitt that he can do things toward building the players' confidence and boosting their morale. He has been hired for four weeks of the 1950 spring baseball training season.

The psychologist will have a free hand at the Burbank, Calif., training base in his efforts to instill a spirit of confidence in the players. He also will concentrate on teaching them how to relax and overcome tension.

"After I teach the players emotional stability," Dr. Tracy told Dewitt, "they will automatically climb higher in the league race. With my treatments, the club should finish fifth and may even climb to fourth."

The club finished seventh in the American league last season and had a narrow escape from the cellar. Incidentally, the Browns drew fewer spectators through the turnstiles than any other team in the major leagues.

The hiring of Dr. Tracy goes back to last summer. Tracy, a former athlete himself, was at the Yankee stadium one Sunday when the Browns dropped a doubleheader to the Yankees. Later he called on Dewitt and his brother, Charley, the club's vice president, and explained how he thought he could help the club.

Dr. Tracy explained to us, "President Dewitt said, 'that under the stress of a hard-fought game a player tenses up. Errors result. Psychology, aiding a player to overcome this mental stumbling block, gets at the bottom of this trouble and enables him to combat these tensions the minute they develop.'"

Wildcats At Cocoa
COCOA, Fla., Dec. 19 (AP)—The Kentucky Wildcats football squad got down to hard work today in preparation for its date with Santa Clara in the Orange Bowl at Miami on January 2.

Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant and a squad of 43 players arrived by plane yesterday for a week's training.

Bob Gain, star lineman for the Wildcats, was delayed and is due in today, with Assistant Coach Frank Moseley.

Gain, 225-pound tackle, received an award in Birmingham, Ala., Saturday night as the Southeastern conference's outstanding lineman of the year.

Bryant said cold weather at home prevented the squad from getting in much practice since the regular season ended. He plans to start scrimmage tomorrow.

Vet Ringster Passes at 75
NEW YORK, Dec. 19 (AP)—Tom McCardie, who spent more than 40 years in boxing as fighter, manager and promoter, died yesterday after an operation. He was 75.

McCardie was matchmaker for the Twentieth Century Sporting club first under the late Tex Rickard and later under Mike Jacobs.

He was credited with having discovered the late Benny Leonard, lightweight champion.

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
