California Log Cut Hits Record

BURKLEY, Calif., Dec. 19 (AP)—The California forest and range experiment station reports that lumber production in California in 1948 exceeded all previous records for the third successive year. The cut was estimated at 3,982,910,000 board feet.

The 1948 production was 16 per cent above 1947 and continued a trend that has been generally upward for the last 10 years. Humboldt county again was the largest producer in 1948. Other leading counties, each cutting more than 200,000,000 board feet, were Mendocino, Siskiyou, Plumas, Lassen,

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Shasta and possibly El Dorado. The leading species of lumber and cut were: Ponderosa pine, 1,458,120,000 board feet; Douglas fir, 925,440,000 board feet; redwood, 793,250,000 board feet; white fir and fir, 471,100,000 board feet, and sugar pine, 226,930,000 board feet.

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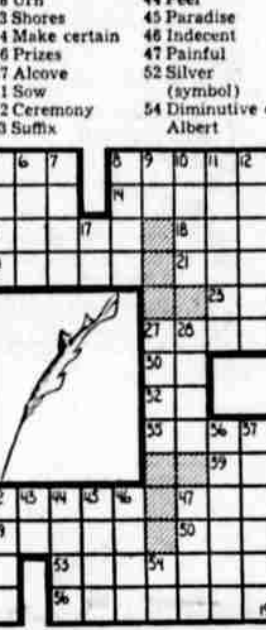
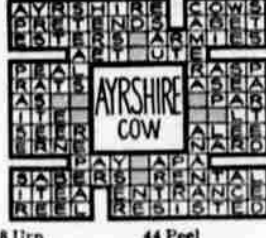

Bits of odds and ends in the mailbox on Saturday included a two-foot square "Rogergram" from Roy Rogers.

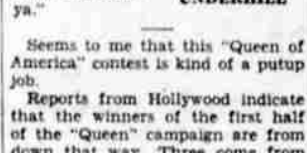
Twice in essence a Christmas message from the crooning cowboy. Came by "Trigger Express," and I had to pay the fee in oats.
