## 23 Years Ago

Monday, December 20, 1926 — ROCKY POINT (Special) — A small "kicker" boat has been completed for M. H. Wampler who plans to use the boat in tending his trap line on the lake. Cap Hansberry completed the boat. . . An inspector of the American National Fox Breeders Association was in this locality the past week inspecting the fox in this area.

Tuesday, December 21, 1926 — Wrath of the goods is lying in wait for a local restaurant man. Off and on, he supplies inmates of the county jail with food, and said prisoners believe the food is not all that it could be. Each night they join in a prayer to Santa Claus that the restaurant man be arrested and thrown in jail, where, in addition to having to eat his own food, he will face the rigorous ordeal of a kangaroo court that will make the Spanish inquisition seem tame by comparison.

Wednesday, December 22, 1926 — Miss Charlotte Buesing, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. August Buesing, is reported as improving at the Klamath Valley hospital where she is a patient. For several days her condition has been serious and her many friends will be glad to learn she is improving.

Thursday, December 23, 1926 — WILKESBARRE, Pa. — A judicial definition of the Charleston: "A forceful, rhythmical, uplifting, highly inspirational, terpsichorean gyration of the lower limbs, which sapient legislation has not yet made criminal." Such is the Charleston as described by County Judge Henry A. Fuller.

Friday, December 24, 1926 — TOKYO, (AP) (Saturday) — Emperor Yoshihito of Japan died of pneumonia at 1:25 a. m. The numerous physicians who attended him for a fortnight did everything possible for the monarch, but his condition was seen to be hopeless. Crown Prince Hirohito, who has been regent since November 1921, succeeded to the throne becoming Japan's 124th emperor.

Saturday, December 25, 1926 — Klamath's Christmas was the quietest on record, is the belief of local officials. No crimes and no serious auto accidents marred the day and there were no fires. Fine weather found hundreds enjoying drives near the city. The poor were well taken care of through the efforts of the community chest, no family failing to receive necessities.
