Goose Hangs High For Holiday Dinner

Roast goose for Christmas! That is an old, old tradition in many parts of the world.

How to roast a goose: Allow 1 to 1 1/2 pounds per person. Remove all pin feathers with tip of a sharp knife or a pair of tweezers. Singe to remove any down. Wash. Dry. Season inside with salt. Stuff loosely.

Sew up with heavy thread or lace with toothpicks and string. Tie legs in place. Fasten wings down by driving a long skewer through the goose and hooking wings under it. Then fasten with string.

Season skin with salt and pepper. Prick skin thoroughly with sharp pronged fork to let fat run out. Place on roasting pan. Add 1 cup water to pan. Place in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) and roast uncovered, allowing 20 to 25 minutes per pound.

At the end of 30 minutes, remove bird from pan and pour off fat. Handle very carefully for the fat is very hot. Return to pan, add another cup of water and bake another half hour. Pour off fat again. Add another cup of water and continue roasting until tender.

Gravy may be made from drippings and stock from giblets. Garnish platter with parsley and trim legs with paper ruffles if desired. Broiled pineapple slices topped with tiny bunches of red grapes make an attractive garnish for the platter.

Spicy Fruit Stuffing
(Makes enough for 3 to 9-pound geese)

Seven cups dry bread cut in small cubes, 1 cup chopped apple, 1/2 cup chopped celery, 1/2 cup sliced raisins, 1/2 cup chopped walnuts or chestnuts, 1/2 cup melted butter, 1 teaspoon onion salt, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 1 teaspoon powdered sage, 1 teaspoon powdered thyme, 1 tablespoon dried parsley flakes.

Combine bread, apple, celery, raisins and nuts. Add seasonings to butter. Add gradually to bread mixture, stirring constantly.
