

Annual Bird Count Set For Dec. 26

The annual Christmas bird count which is taken each year by the Nature Society of the Klamath Region will be made on Monday, December 26, between the hours of 9 a. m. and 3 p. m.

Each year, for the past 50 years, bird watchers all over the nation take one day during the Christmas week to make a pilgrimage into the open country to search for birds, to record the species and to tally the number present.

The Christmas season is selected for this undertaking because it is a period midway between the migration seasons. The birds who go south each year have generally passed on to lands with milder winter climate and it is still too early in the winter for the birds in the southlands to start thinking about going north to spend the summer.

Few Now
The bird population for this area is at the lowest ebb of the year as only those birds that live with us the year around or those who prefer to winter here with us rather than go on to warmer areas will be the only species to be noted in the Christmas bird count.

The Christmas count made by the Nature society in 1948 was on December 26. It was taken by eleven members working in five groups. A total of 4826 birds were counted belonging to 60 different species. The day was stormy and the heavy overcast did not give good visibility. The temperature ranged from 21 to 27 degrees, the lakes were frozen over but the rivers were open and the 4 to 6 inches of snow on the ground made it a rugged day from the standpoint of the comfort of the bird watchers; however, the day was chosen because it presented the very factors that strike hard at the life of the birds at this season.

Invitation
The Nature society invites anyone interested in birds who would care to join in making this year's Christmas bird count to do so. Information can be obtained from Mrs. Lawrence A. French, 1412 Crescent avenue, phone 4110. Bird counting parties are not required to spend the full six hours in the field, some groups may only devote an hour to the count during the day. Any amount of time spent on the project will be welcome.

The observing time ends at 3 p. m. after which the counting groups will meet at the home of Mrs. William M. Harris, 935 Front street for coffee and an indoor picnic supper, report their luck at observation and compile the final report of the Christmas bird count.
