Washington's game with Stanford in Seattle tonight is the only one on tap among the coast conference squads.

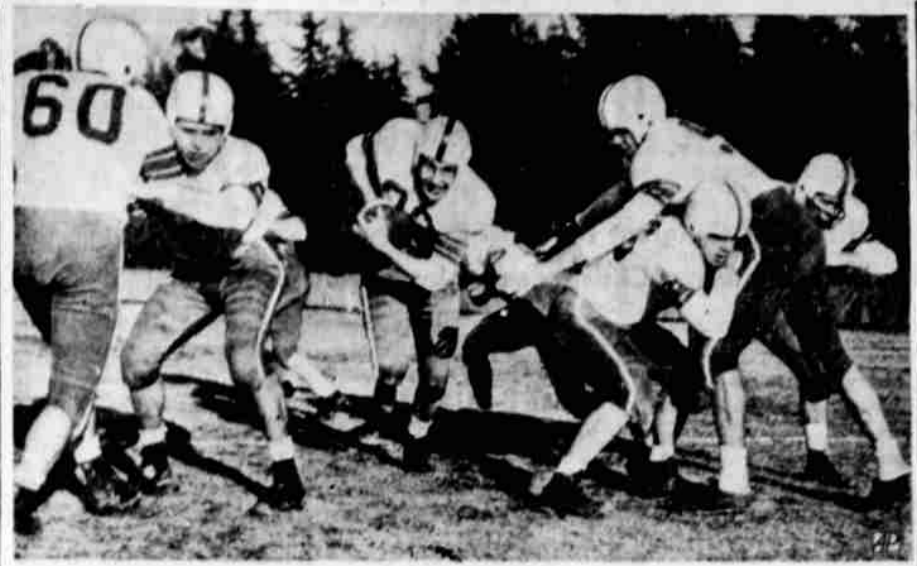

The commissioner of Indian affairs, Zimmerman, made a brief visit to the reservation recently to hear complaints against the Klamath Agency administration, and at that time, Crawford said, it was disclosed that "between \$60,000 and \$65,000 of credit to commercial houses in Chiloquin and Klamath Falls had been put out to some Indians on the IOU of Royd Jackson, tribal loan board chairman."

Crawford said "irregularities" were practices in the loan board and that the board has no bookkeeping system, and charged that the million-dollar loan board fund figured prominently in politics on the reservation.
