UCLA Topples La Salle From Unbeaten Row

Stanich, Sheldrake Pot Field Goals in Last Forty Seconds

NEW YORK, Dec. 27 (AP)—UCLA and Western Kentucky demonstrated last night they must be ranked among the nation's leading college basketball teams.

Fresh from a 65-63 victory over Illinois in the touring UCLA quintet knocked LaSalle out of the unbeaten ranks 62-57 in the feature of a twin bill at Philadelphia.

Western Kentucky, opening its annual eastern tour, put on a second half spurt that dethroned Canisius, 74-61, in the top attraction of a doubleheader at Buffalo.

UCLA and Western Kentucky each have lost only once, UCLA to San Francisco and Western Kentucky to Cincinnati.

San Francisco, the national invitation tournament champion, took it on the chin again in Madison Square Garden, this time a 56-48 licking from Long Island.

Utah, from the Skyline Six conference, fell before St. Joseph's of Philadelphia in the other game at Philly, 69-68. A free throw by Phil Brady in the last 24 seconds got the Utes off to a poor start on their eastern invasion.

UCLA traveled LaSalle at one time in the second half by 11 points, but rallied to win on field goals by George Stanich and Eddie Sheldrake in the last 40 seconds.

In the Garden first game Santa Clara spurred in the closing minutes to whip Manhattan, 73-44. In the first game at Buffalo Temple broke a three-game losing streak by trimming Buffalo University, 66-48.

A total of 42,290 saw the three doubleheaders; 16,000 at the Garden, 10,891 at Buffalo and 5,399 at Philadelphia.

In the night's only other game Idaho handed Lawrence Tech its fourth straight setback, 63-44.

Climax Runners May Make Rose Bowl Fans Happy New Year Day

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 27 (AP)—California and Ohio State each will field large football teams in the Rose Bowl January 3, and rival lines gifted in stout defensive tactics that can hardly bid for crowd appeal.

But each team also packs a player or two able and liable to explode for long scoring plays which very definitely qualify for the fancy of the football fans.

Ohio State employs an offense that stems off the T, the split T and even drifts into a single wing on occasion, and most anyone in the four backfield positions is apt to throw a pass when least expected.

California is more conservative in the passing department. Quarterback Bob Celeri handling this chore almost exclusively. His elective pass-run threat, however, can keep opponents in a quandary and the on-lookers in a state of excitement.

Only yesterday Coach Lynn Waldorf of California mentioned that he has no climax runner such as he had last year in Halfback Jackie Jensen.

Waldorf probably meant he had not a consistent climax runner, but there was nothing wrong with Halfback Frank Brunk the day he ran 102 yards to sing the Rose Bowl dreams of Southern California, or Brunk's efforts when he filled in for the injured Jensen in last New Year's game.

Due in the Bear camp was Halfback Jack Swanner, detained at home awaiting the arrival of the stork. Swanner, incidentally, is on the explosive side, too. He came off the injury list against Stanford to roll up 100 yards and three touchdowns in 15 trips with the ball.

And Celeri, don't forget, holds six all-time school records for passing and is responsible for 1135 yards running and passing the ball this year.

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Northern Gridders Win, 20-14

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 27 (AP)—A squad of hand-picked Northern College football players overpowered a select group of Southern Collegians in the second annual Shrine charity game in the Orange Bowl last night, 20-14.

The Yankees evened the score for last year's 24-14 southern triumph and did it convincingly before 37,378 rain-soaked fans.

Yale Coach Herman Hickman's hefties came charging back to erase a 6-7 half-time deficit with two quick touchdowns in the third quarter and another in the fourth.

The Rebels, under Coaches Andy Gustafson of Miami and Bob Woodruff of Baylor, grabbed a lead in the second quarter on a 80-yard touchdown run by Vanderbilt's Lee Nalley.

The speedy halfback took a hand-off from Miami's White Campbell and, behind perfect blocking, raced down the sidelines to put the South ahead. Forrest Griffith of Kansas added the extra point, his first of two for the evening.

With the third period only five minutes old, the Yankees struck for their first touchdown with Notre Dame's Walter Grothaus recovering a South fumble on the South's 24.

Two plays later Villanova's Steve Romanik passed to Harry Wettlauf of Pennsylvania to the eight. Larry Coutre of Notre Dame rammed through to the four and then squirmed to the one foot line.

Romanik sneaked over for the touchdown. Ralph Pasquerello of Villanova missed the extra point.

The South still led, but not for long. Pennsylvania's Ray Dooney took a pitchout around right end and went eight yards to score with two Rebel tacklers still hanging on. Billy Bye of Minnesota kicked the extra point and the Yankees went ahead, 13-7.

The North hiked its lead in the fourth quarter after Dooney recovered a South fumble on the Rebel's 10. On the next play Pasquerello scored on a pitchout around right end. Bye again added the extra point.

Rupe Wright of Baylor recovered Dooney's fumble on the North's 43 and the Rebels took it from there. Griffith traveling the final 15 yards for the touchdown.

The Yankees racked up 22 first downs to the South's seven and gained 350 net yards rushing to the Rebels' 73.

Ted Williams Tabbed 1949 Slugging King In American League

CHICAGO, Dec. 27 (AP)—Boston's Ted Williams was officially crowned the American League's 1949 slugging king today while an assortment of 39 major league records was certified as broken or tied for the season.

Williams, shaded out of the batting title by Detroit's George Kell 3429 to 3427, hammered 650 in the slugging division, this percentage figured on total divided by times at bat.

Williams and his teammate, Vern Stephens, finished in a dead heat for the RBI honor, each slugging in 159. Each had a chance to take the crown outright on the final day, but both failed to produce against New York pitching.

Joe Di Maggio of the Yankees, sidelined until midseason with a painful heel injury, was second among sluggers with 556. Stephens, the stocky Red Sox shortstop, was third with 539. Di Maggio belted in 67 runs in 76 games. Williams and Stephens were in 155 games.

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
