

OTI Students To Recover Deductions

Deductions felt by many OTI students in their November GI bill of rights subsistence checks will be made up in a later check, veterans administration officials have informed school authorities.

Checks received November 30 were short from \$28 to \$32 each, deductions made for time elapsed between semesters when no classes were held although students already enrolled were still on the campus.

Most OTI students are ex-servicemen and receive GI school assistance.

Some families rely entirely on their government checks to meet living expenses, it was pointed out by students.

Applications VA will provide application forms for each student who was shorted in his November check immediately after the Christmas holidays, to enable them to make up the amount of the deduction.

In the future, school enrollment policy is to be changed to a school year rather than a semester basis to prevent recurrence of the deductions.

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City Postal Receipts Hit Record High

Another indication of the growth of Klamath Falls was reported today as Postmaster Burt E. Hawkins announced that postal receipts for this year already have passed the quarter of a million dollar mark.

"Receipts for the calendar year on December 23, amounted to \$250,029.66," Hawkins said. "By this indication we can estimate that receipts after December 31, will be about \$254,000 for the year 1941."

This money comes from the sale of stamps and rentals of post office boxes. Money orders, and postal savings are not included in this total, Hawkins said.

Receipts for 1940 are about \$10,000 more than in 1939, and the highest reached here.

This new record will place Klamath Falls in a higher grade of post office classification. At present the local post office is in grade eight, selling from \$200,000 to \$250,000 receipts a year.

New classifications will be published in July, six months after closing of the year. At present there are 22 grades of post offices in the United States.

Local Stores Report Big Yule Business

Main street was returning to normal today as the Christmas season came to a close as far as buying went but many merchants said they had the biggest holiday business in years.

A re-cap of business and next year's policy to be followed during Christmas season, will be heard at the January meeting of the Klamath Merchants association, according to President Rudy Jacobs. The breakfast session is slated for 8 a.m. January 11 at the Winema hotel. There will also be election of officers.

Christmas decorations will remain up until after New Year's Day when they will be taken down and stored in a bomb proof shelter at the municipal airport, Jacobs said.

An autopsy was ordered immediately. Carnes lay on the bathroom floor, a deep gash in his head. A pool of blood covered nearly the entire kitchen floor which was littered with glass.

His body was found by a sister, Mrs. Esther Poland of Tacoma, who said she became concerned when he failed to appear at her home for Christmas dinner. She said her brother came to Seattle last spring and planned to move his wife and 10-year-old twin daughters here soon. The family lives in Los Angeles.

Buick Cuts Prices Of Some Models

FLINT, Mich., Dec. 27 (AP)—Price cuts ranging from \$65 to \$310 were announced today by Buick Motors or certain of its 1950 model cars. The reductions include a recently announced cut of \$40 on Buick's torque converter transmission.

Engineering and styling details of the new models will be disclosed tomorrow. The new lower price tags affect models in the Roadmaster and super series. No change is made on the special series, introduced last August.

The Roadmaster series \$65 and \$76 cuts are made respectively in the sedan and four-door sedan, while \$190 reductions are made on the convertible, \$310 on the so-called hard-top convertible and \$290 on the estate wagon.

In the super series the convertible is cut \$85 and the estate wagon \$300. The permanent home of the United Nations in New York City is expected to be completed by the fall of 1951.

Tug Speeds to Aid Of Grounded Ship

MANILA, Dec. 27 (AP)—Four tug speed today to the aid of the British motorship Silverwalnut held fast on Royal Captain shoal in the South China sea.

The 6770 ton ship went aground yesterday 50 miles west of Palawan island. Her crew of 61 and four passengers were reported safe today by the Roosevelt steamship agency in Manila.

A tropical storm approaching the Philippines from the east may endanger the grounded ship. Captain George Reay did not mention any immediate danger in a message from the vessel.

Baby Killer Sentenced To Gas Death

FRESNO, Dec. 27 (AP)—Paul Gutierrez stood unmoving and with downcast eyes today as Superior Judge Arthur C. Shepard sentenced him to die in the gas chamber for the sex-slaying of a 17-month-old baby.

The defendant's aged mother, Mrs. Guadalupe Gutierrez, fainted when the judge announced the sentence.

Judge Shepard found the 25-year-old cotton picker guilty of first degree murder last Wednesday in the non-jury trial Gutierrez requested. He also found him sane at the time of the crime.

Gutierrez was charged with the slaying of tiny Josephine Yanes last November 20. The body, torn and bruised, was found with head pushed down into a muddy field at Purton.

Couple, Child Are Missing

WALLA WALLA, Dec. 27 (AP)—The snow-covered Blue mountains continued to hold secret today the fate of a missing air force sergeant, his wife and five-year-old child.

Sgt. Frank Eaton and his family have been unreported since taking off Saturday for Ontario, Ore., en route to spend the holidays with his parents at Lake Tahoe, Calif.

Thirty civilian pilots from Walla Walla and the Oregon cities of Pendleton, La Grande and Baker scanned the region futilely yesterday for the single engine plane. An air force rescue B-17 also joined the search from McChord base.
