Three Skiers Injured At Crater Lake

First skiing accidents of the season at Crater Lake national park were reported by rangers this morning following a heavy day of travel into the area this week-end.

On Monday rangers gave first aid to three injured skiers, two from Klamath Falls and one from Medford.

Cliff Shafer, 24, OVI student, fell while skiing at Knob hill and his ski pole spike severely damaged his left ear. It was necessary to take stitches to close the wound.

John W. Baker, 19, 247 N. Eldorado, and a Balsiger employe, is at his home recovering from a fractured right ankle and leg. Young Baker said he had skied down the Knob hill slope and at the bottom his ski caught in a hole made in the snow where another skier had fallen.

Rangers gave first aid on the spot and Baker was then moved in the park station wagon to headquarters and on to Klamath Falls by members of his party.

Loose Ski
The third accident Monday involved Helen Robertson, 21, 534 Berrydale, Medford, bookkeeper at the Medford branch of the United States National bank. She lost a ski from a loose binder and suffered a possible fracture of the left ankle.

Rangers advised 95 cars carrying 340 people entered the park on Monday. 45 cars carrying 151 skiers alone.

Skiing should be excellent during the holidays and next week-end the rope tow and hot lunch concessions will be available, rangers advised.

Chief Ranger Louis Hallock asked cooperation of motorists in entering the park. Cars should stop, Hallock said, and put on chains at the boundary.

England Crippled By Train Strike

LONDON, Dec. 27 (AP)—The second day of a wildcat train stoppage stranded thousands of holiday travelers in London and the south of England today.

Less than a score of 268 motor-men slated for duty reported for work on the south region electric lines of the state-owned British railway system. The strike began yesterday because of dissatisfaction with the holiday duty roster.

Soldiers and sailors due back at their stations after holiday leave piled up at Waterloo station, main terminus of the lines.

GOP Seen Winning White Collar Friends in Survey

PRINCETON, N. J.—Republican strategy committees now working on campaign plans for 1950 could very well focus attention on one problem.

That is the need for the Republican party to "sell" a larger bloc of voters on the idea that their own interests are best represented by the Republicans.

This job has already been done successfully in the group comprising business and professional people, and there is evidence that the Republicans have also made substantial progress among white-collar or office workers.

This latter group, by a small margin, today says that the Republican party represents its interest best.

But in the case of skilled and unskilled workers and farmers, the Democratic party holds a very substantial advantage at present.

The American Institute of Public Opinion selected an accurate cross-section for the country, and had interviewers ask the following question of voters:

"As you feel TODAY, which political party, the Republican or Democratic, do you think serves the interests of the following groups BEST?"

The groups listed were: farmers; business owners and professional people; skilled workers, such as carpenters, plumbers, electricians; unskilled workers, such as manual laborers; and white-collar workers or office workers.

Affected voting on the above question, each person was asked: "In which of these occupational groups would you place YOURSELF?"

The following tables show the vote for each group by persons who place themselves into that particular occupational group:

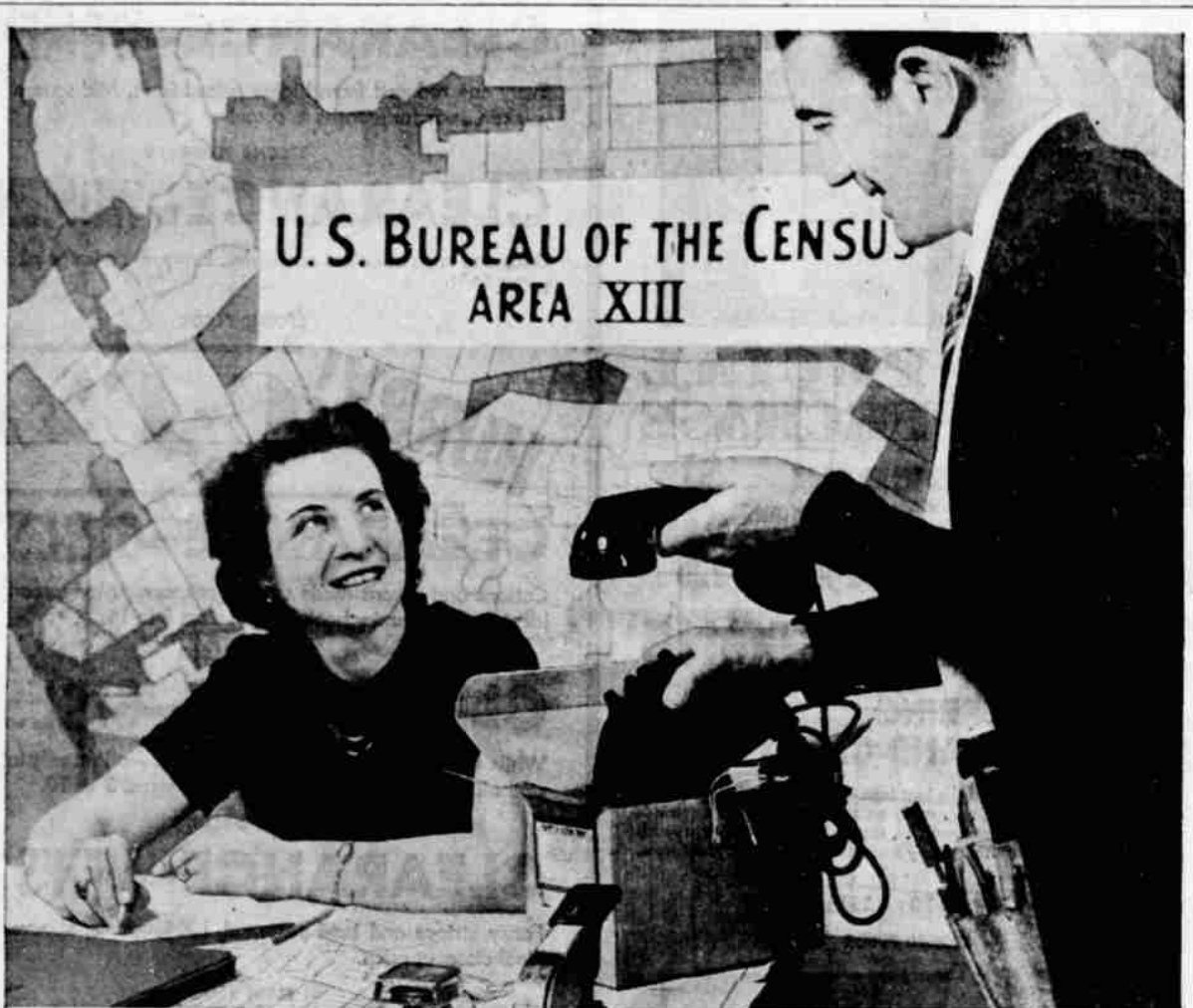
