

New Car Models Slated For Showing Next Month

DETROIT, (AP)—The first 1952 model automobiles are scheduled to be announced next month. At present no model changes are under way although considerable preparatory work is being done. Also, Willys-Overland reportedly has begun pilot production of its new conventional style passenger car.

Willys hasn't had a conventional type passenger unit since before World War two. It has done a lot of experimental work with cars of varying size. Finally ready for the assembly line is one substantially different from the earlier experimental models.

Willys apparently has given up the idea of building a "small" car. Instead of a 100-mph wheelbase vehicle the new Willys unit is reported to be only a few inches shorter than the present Ford, Chevrolet and Plymouth models.

JETS TO PORTLAND
PORTLAND, (AP)—The 123rd fighter interceptor squadron here will get jet planes this coming weekend.

Also, it is understood to have a six cylinder engine. Just when it will be delivered to dealers is yet to be disclosed.

The parade of 1952 models, starting in November, is going to stretch out over the following four or five months, according to present plans. Chrysler's 1952 line probably will be among the first to appear, to be followed in December and January by some of the General Motors and Ford models.

Current plans call for only modest changes in the Chrysler and GM units. However, it is said in automobile circles that later in 1952 Chrysler may be able to introduce some new engines of the V-8 type in its DeSoto and Dodge cars.

First of the Ford cars to appear will be the Lincoln and Mercury models, due for material changes. The new Ford line probably will appear in February. Industry circles hear that major alterations are planned for these models.

Industry quarters also are talking about the probability that the new Lincolns and Cadillacs will boast significant advances in their power plants. Chrysler, with its 180-horsepower V-8 engine, currently has the most powerful engine in any standard car being built.

Chrysler also has power steering and advance braking. The power steering device and the recently announced Bendix power braking are scheduled to be offered by the makers of some 1952 model cars.

NASH
Among the so-called "independents" Nash probably will have the most significant design changes. But they aren't likely to be uncovered much before next April.

All the other car makers, of course, will have changes to boast about in their new models, but their changes will not be radical. Some, like Hudson and Studebaker, in a definite engineering changes in their power plants only last year.

Hudson's Hornet model had a widely acclaimed new six cylinder engine, giving high compression performance on "regular" gasoline. Studebaker brought out a new V-8, that doesn't require any changes, according to expert engineer opinion.

Young Demos Argue Split

ST. LOUIS, (AP)—A cry of "are you Democrats or Dixiecrats?" temporarily marred the harmony of the opening day of the national young Democratic convention.

Business was going along on schedule yesterday until it was South Carolina's turn to be seated. Then the Dixiecrat issue arose.

After a debate an executive committee voted 44 to 32 to admit three South Carolina delegates: headed by James P. Harrelson of Waterbury.

He said he had voted for Prewitt, Truman and would vote for him "against anything the Republicans have to offer."

Another squabble halted seating of a Tennessee delegation but the Dixiecrat issue didn't enter into that one.

Two groups arrived here expecting to be seated. When they could not get together the convention as a whole voted 540 to 58 to seat a seven-member group headed by Percy Satterfield of Nashville. Robert Broome of Knoxville, leader of the other delegation, said his group would continue to attend.

Following a panel discussion today on "organizing in the state," the delegates will hear Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois and Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.).

Tax Blanks Sold At High Prices

ROME, (AP)—Income tax report blanks sold for 500 lire (75 cents) on the black market today and the rate was climbing. The normal price is 25 lire. The blanks are put on sale by the state in the nation's tobacco shops. When the government issued a recent call to the tax reports, sellers moved in and bought up all available stocks of blanks.
