EUGENE'S AERIAL RALLY NIPS PELS

Henkel's Passes Give Axemen 20-12 Victory

EUGENE (Special) Eugene sophomore Jack Henkel warmed up his passing arm in the fourth quarter last night to beat the Klamath Falls Pelicans, 20-12.

Trailing 12-7, Henkel pitched two strikes to halfback Jerry Weeks for gains of 20 and 31 yards to put Eugene ahead 14-12. After Bob Morgan ran over the conversion, Henkel hit end Don Smith with two passes for gains of 19 and 16 yards to spark the third touchdown. Bob Radcliffe punted five yards to cap a 52-yard drive with slightly more than two minutes left in the game.

GO TO AIR
The Pelicans monopolized the play until the final fourth quarter. Eugene was unable to generate any power on the ground and, but for Henkel's radar arm, would have lost.

However, the Axemen scored first early in the opening period when Klamath Falls quarterback Chick Quinowski fumbled back to pass. He hit hard by Bob McHenry, lost the handle on the ball, and Ed Jim Burgett scooped the ball up on the 15 and ran over for the score.

Radcliffe punted over for the point after touchdown.

LONG MARCH
The Pelicans took the next kickoff and marched 63 yards in eight plays, plus a penalty on Eugene. Zen Young, by far the outstanding runner on the field, accelerated the march with runs of 19 and 15 yards. Dick Lundsten added scampers of 12 and six yards.

Young carried over from the two after Eugene had been neutralized from the nine to that spot for unnecessary roughness.

Young's attempted conversion kick went to the left and the Pels trailed 7-6 at the half, although Eugene led the Axemen's 27 and eight in threatening drives.

TAKE LEAD
Klamath Falls took the lead, 12-7, in the third quarter with Bill Pickett's eight-yard pass to Ray Bell coupling a 48-yard surge in seven plays.

Big gains in the march were a 32-yard gain on a pass from Young

to Bell and Young's 12-yard gallop. The point-after-touchdown try failed with just 1:45 left in the third period.

That's when Henkel went to work in the air and Eugene pulled out the victory with its fourth-quarter aerial binge.

COUGARS WALLOP AGGIES

SPOKANE, (AP)—The Washington State college Cougars, miking passing and running game, overcame the sharp passing of quarterback Don Babers to knock out a 27-13 victory over Oklahoma A & M yesterday.

The inexperienced Aggies, passing on almost every play against the heavier Cougars, led at 6-0 and 13-7 before Washington State turned the tide.

The Babers arm was the chief factor in the victory. He completed 22 of 34 passes for 225 yards. The Aggies meanwhile lost 12 of 30 on the ground.

THREE STRAIGHT
Babers stung the Cougars with three straight completions in the first 90 seconds, the last going 33 yards to Dean Seaman for a touchdown. Skip Warren's kick wasn't good.

WSC moved ahead at 7-6 when linebacker Bill Mayberry intercepted a Babers pass on the Aggies' 17 and the Cougars marched to the goal line with Dick Bower going over from the one.

The Aggies soon after recovered a WSC fumble on the Cougar seven and Seaman took it over. Warren converted to make it 13-7.

AHEAD TO STAY
WSC went ahead to stay on a 53-yard pass play from Bob Burkhardt to Ed Barker. Barker took it on the Aggie 49 and scampered the rest of the way.

Leading 14-13, WSC drove 67 yards for a third touchdown. Bud Ruffler scoring on a final three-yard sweep. The Cougars' first final score in the third period on a 54-yard march with Dwight Pool going over from the one.

Babers threatened the Cougars twice in the scoreless fourth quarter. He completed seven passes in a row good for 57 yards until an interception ended the threat on the Cougar 18.

Midway in the period he sprinted 36 yards into the WSC end zone but the ball was called back on a penalty.

Grants Pass, which has been No. 1 in the Associated Press poll of sportswriters and sportsmen since the start of the season, justified its rating by crushing Milwaukie, 57-7.

The two-three rated teams in the poll—Roosevelt and Grant of Portland—looked just about as impressive.

ROOSEVELT WINS
Roosevelt trounced a dangerous Jefferson team, 13-0, while Grant was walloping Washington, 25-6. The Grant victory gave the Generals their 26th consecutive win and a tie in the Portland league race with Lincoln, which had an easy time beating Benson, 14-0, Lincoln has yet to play Grant or Roosevelt, however.

Astoria, the No. 5 rated team, led an easy time downing Central Catholic of Portland, 47-14. Millon-Freewater, ranked No. 6, had things a bit tougher, though. It was hard-pressed to beat Baker,

Giants Send Jim Hearn Against Vic Raschi in Today's Contest

NEW YORK, (AP)—Back home in the friendly Polo Grounds where miracles do happen the underdog New York Giants count on Jim Hearn (17-9) to outpoint Yankee Vic Raschi (21-10) in today's third World Series game.

Not that miracles are needed by this daring career Giant club that stands all even in games, even after succumbing to lefty Ed Lopat's steady pitching, 3-1, yesterday at Yankee stadium. Still, the bookmakers quote the Yanks 8 to 5 favorites in the series.

Memories of Wednesday's dramatic pennant clincher in the shadow of Coogan's Bluff still throb in the mind of every Giant. In the chummy old park where they knew their greatest glory, the Giants figure to be an inspired crew.

LOOKS LIKE HERO
Monte Irvin, hitting .778 and edging up on a record with seven series hits, needs no inspiration. He is well on the way to becoming the '51 hero, win or lose.

The Giants will need a top effort from Hearn, a five-hit winner over Brooklyn in the playoff opener, to guide them past Raschi in this duel of right-handers.

Hearn's sweeping curve and baffling sinker hogtied the Dodger bats Monday in one of his most brilliant moments. Now with four days rest the \$10,000 waiver bargain of '50 is asked to put the Giants back in command. In 34 starts he went the route 12 times, winning 10 of his 17 from Chicago and Pittsburgh.

LEARN TO BUNT
Mantle's surprise drag bunt opening the game was an important factor in yesterday's Yank win over Larry Jansen. Bunting has been a Mantle weakness all season despite daily morning drills. The practice finally paid off.

When Phil Rizzuto followed with another bunt single that Whitney Lockman threw wild to first, Mantle scooted to third. He scored on Gil McDougald's blooper to short right in front of Thompson.

Joe DiMaggio, still looking for his first hit, bounced into a double play and Yogi Berra struck out to let Jansen wiggle out with only one run.

LAST RUN
Joe Collins' 310-foot homer into the lower right field seats, with two out in the second was the last run off Jansen. Also the last hit and the last man to reach base as he retired 13 in a row until he departed for a pinch hitter in the seventh.

George Spencer blew down the next three Yanks to make it 16 in succession before Bobby Brown singled to open the eighth. With Billy Martin running for the slow-footed doctor, Lopat helped nail down his own game with a scoring single to center.

Working easily with his tantalizing slow stiff, screw ball and an occasional Lopat-style fast ball, the chunky lefthander allowed only one hit in five innings. Al Dark's sixth-inning single was a harmless blow.

Although Collins is playing good ball and hitting .333, Stengel may shift to big Johnny Mize in his old Polo Grounds home. Mize hammered many a homer into those right field seats when he played with the Giants.

Chances are the clubs won't decide the issue in the three games at the Polo Grounds today, Sunday and Monday. If nobody wins three straight, they return to the stadium Tuesday and Wednesday, too, if seven are needed.

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Oregon Tech Flunks First League Outing

The Oregon Tech football machine may have been headed for a possible Little Rose Bowl bid but the trip was derailed last night by the Wolves of Oregon College.

The Owls were on the shy side of a 19-6 score in the first Oregon Collegiate conference game for both teams on the 10.

Only twice did OTT's celebrated running game hit on all four in sustained marches.

The first time, after the opening kickoff of the second half, Don Gentin swapped scolding chores to drive 69 yards in 11 plays but the march stalled on OCE's eighth-yard line with the help of a costly five-yard penalty.

FUMBLE
But on the first play the Monmouth eleven fumbled and OTT recovered on the only extra point.

An offside penalty on the Wolves after one play put the ball on the four-yard line. From there, quarterback Querino Lelli squirted through for a score when the Wolves were looking for something else. The halfbacks were far out on the wings and fullback Jeter looked ready to plow through.

Gentin's kick was blocked and the score stood, 8-0.

Oregon College scored in the first quarter with fullback Bill Palmquist capping a 50-yard drive from the two-yard line.

A penalty for unnecessary roughness was costly on the third down with the Owls holding the Wolves on the 10-yard line. The penalty put the ball on two-yard stripes from where Palmquist bombed over for the score.

The Oregon College line throttled the Owls in the first half and only once did the Hilltoppers surge past midfield and then only to the 47-yard line.

The Wolves decided to do something about the dead-end clock on the last play of the third quarter when halfback Charles Pinion intercepted a pass thrown by Lelli. Pinion gathered the ball in on the Oregon Tech 40 and was hauled down on the 24.

BREAKS TIE
Palmquist ripped to the eight-yard line. But the Owls line stiffened and two plays gained just three yards. But, on the third play, Bud Michaels skirted end for the tie-breaking score. The kick was blocked.

After an exchange of punts, the Owls perked up for their second rally serious bid in a desperate attempt to tie the score again.

Foreman ripped off nine yards from his own 23, then took a flat pass from Jack Brown, reversed his field and went down on OCE's 36 when he cut too sharply on the slightly damp field. Jeter smashed to the 23 after a five-yard penalty

his place.

Mickey Mantle, the 19-year-old Yank rookie, twisted his right knee yesterday and was carried from the field. X-rays will be taken today to determine the full extent of the injury, believed to be a slightly torn tendon. Stengel doesn't expect to get any more action out of the kid in the series.

It was a strange accident with Mantle, striding toward a fly ball that Joe DiMaggio eventually caught in right center, falling flat on his face when the knee gave away. Apparently he stepped hard in a small hole.

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
