

Dalton-Gates Nuptial Rites

Nearly two hundred guests and relatives attended an afternoon wedding of basin-wide interest, which was solemnized at St. Paul's Episcopal church Sunday, September 30 at four o'clock. KLAMATH FALLS GARDEN CLUB

Klamath Falls Garden Club met Monday October 1, at the city library. W. C. DePew of Klamath Falls, who gave the most informative talk on the care of house plants. Our attitude and lack of humidity are discouraging factors to newcomers in our vicinity who endeavor to raise houseplants, Mr. DePew stated. However, an adjustment of rules of watering will insure immediate success. Houseplants in Klamath require four times the amount of water as do those in the neighboring valley regions.

There are three groups of house plants: blooming plants, foliage plants, and succulents. Blooming plants are probably the most tricky of the lot. The best method of success with them is to duplicate as nearly as possible, the conditions under which they live in their native habitat.

One of the most common of house plants is the cyclamen. It prefers a cool atmosphere and a fair amount of light (not direct sunlight). The upper part of the bulb should always be exposed above the soil and it is imperative that air be permitted to circulate freely across this section of bulb. Watering from the base is ideal for all blooming house plants. Set the pot in a pan of water, preferably lukewarm for approximately one hour.

The poinsettia is the most temperamental of the group, and also one of the thirstiest. It demands a temperature range between 50 and 60 degrees. A large plant consumes one and a half pints of water a day. The azalea is Asiatic in origin. It enjoys indirect light, much water and good drainage.

Bulbs which are forced for indoor bloom such as tulips, daffodils and Chinese lilies are usually kept in a cool dark room, and well watered until almost blooming time when they are brought into the light. After blooming, they may be planted in the garden.

Other popular potted plants include the chrysanthemum, which blooms over a long period, likes a cool atmosphere and plenty of water. Begonias which require much water and indirect light; potted roses, for the most part the hardy climber type, require an average amount of water and demand good drainage always, and the hydrangea, an ideal house plant of easy culture which reveals in a deluge of water.

The foliage group is classified as tropical and temperate. Both classes thrive under approximately the same treatment. They do well most any place except in very dark corners. Chinese evergreens, prayer plants, ivies, ferns, and philodendrons are included in this category. Ferns and ivies will thrive in direct sunlight. An occasional spraying of lukewarm water is beneficial to any foliage plant.

Succulents include all the cacti, sansevieria, echinaria (hen-and-chickens), and others of a fleshy-leaved nature. This group requires a minimum of water, depending of course, upon their position in or out of direct sunlight. Usually, a light watering every 4 or 5 days is sufficient. Being by nature desert plants, succulents prefer a layer of sand on the surface of the soil. In placing plants where they will receive direct sunlight through glass, caution must be used not to burn the plants.

Specimen blooms exhibited at the meeting included: decorative and semi-cactus dahlias by Mrs. Malcolm Teare, mignon and peony-flowered dahlias by Mrs. G. A. Krause and rust-colored helianthus by Mrs. G. K. Cummings.
