SOROPTIMIST

On Thursday, October 4, the Soroptimist club, at Klamath Falls, joined the 478 member clubs of the American Federation of Soroptimist Clubs in Canada, the United States, Alaska, Hawaii, Brazil and Cuba to celebrate the pearl anniversary of the founding of Soroptimism.

The luncheon meeting was held in the Pelican parly room, President Oia Smith in charge.

Coral Sabo was chairman of the day, presenting a talented young vocalist, Gerry Igl, in a group of songs accompanied by Eloise McIntyre. Gerry sang "By the Waters of Minnetonka," "Just a Wearyin' for You" and "For you Alone."

Mrs. Sabo spoke on Founder's Day giving a history of the organization, acquainting new members with the aims and ambitions of the club, and stressing to older members what the organization stands for. It was recalled that the first Soroptimist club was founded at Oakland, Calif., September 21, 1921 by Helena Gambie and a group of business women. The club was dedicated to service and to the betterment of their community. The name chosen was "Soroptimist" coined from two Latin words, "soror" meaning sister, and "optima" meaning "the best and the best good." Translated freely the name means "the best for women," objective of all Soroptimist clubs. In organizing, the women followed the pattern of existing men's clubs. Membership was by invitation, and was limited to established active executive women in specified classification, with only one member from a classification in each club. The Soroptimist club may adopt and aid a foreign club, and also sponsor a Venture club of young professional women.

Ida Momyer Odell, a charter member of the Klamath Falls club, gave a brief history of the local club, which was organized in 1926, and was the second club in the state, being sponsored by the only other club, Portland. The sponsoring club presented the local one with a large American flag. Mrs. Pearl Young of Stockton, Calif., was also a sponsor of the present Soroptimist club.

Birthday greetings from Miss L. Grace Nicholls, Toronto Canada, president of the American Federation of Soroptimist clubs, urged the addition of two extra activities, service to all Soroptimist programs—active participation in civilian defense and support of highways safety program.

The year jubilee was marked by a contribution of pennies, one from every member for each of the 30 years—for fellowships. These fellowships are awarded to women scholars for advanced work in research.

Following the program a "quiz game" was held on the history of the Soroptimist club.

It was announced that Ruth Adams is the new chairman of the blood bank, and that Maude Goeller is Defense Bond chairman. Miss Bertha Kohlhaugen, Salem, and supervisor of home economics education in the state, was a guest at luncheon and won the award for the day.

Ruth Stark announced that it was her last day at club as she soon leaves for her new home at Onden, Utah. The beautiful flowers on the luncheon tables were furnished by Jennie Southwell, from her garden.
