Reynolds vs. Maglie Today

NEW YORK, (AP)—Saved by rain from gambling on Johnny Sain, Mr. Casey Stengel switched to Alvin Reynolds (17-8), his Yankee ace, in an effort to even the World Series in today's fourth game at the Polo Grounds. Reynolds will go against Sal Maglie (23-6), the Giants' best.

Stengel had pondered a change from Sain to Tom Morgan for the Sunday game, holding Sain for relief. When the game was postponed by rain and wet grounds, he gladly hopped to Reynolds.

Down 3-1 in games after losing Saturday, Stengel would have been forced to match a second string pitcher with the Giants' close-shaving barber. Now it's ace against ace.

CONFIDENT
"I'm confident about Reynolds," said Stengel. "I know he can pitch better than he did in the first game."

"We would like to have played the game," said Mgr. Leo Durocher of the Giants "but I think it helps us as much as them. Maglie can use that extra day of rest."

Reynolds, double no-hit winner in the regular season, failed Stengel Thursday in the opener at Yankee stadium. The big Indian just didn't have it, giving up eight hits and all five runs before he left after six innings. He was anxious to get back at the Giants that he threw in the bullpen during Saturday's 6-2 Giant victory.

HAS REST
The Giants had to hold out Maglie until this late in the series because he worked the final play-off game against Brooklyn Wednesday. Sal left for a pinchhitter after eight innings and Larry Jansen came in to get the win on

Bobby Thomson's dramatic homer. The 34-year-old vet with the movie villain sideburns needs three days' rest for a top effort. He's had four.

Unless Stengel changes his mind, the Yanks will present a revised batting order with Hank leading off, Yogi Berra batting third and Gene Woodling, who hit a homer Saturday, in Yogi's old fifth spot.

Was Stengel thinking of moving Joe DiMaggio, hitless in 11 trips, out of the cleanup spot?

DIMAGGIO STAYS
"No sir," Stengel answered. "I won't do it in the series. You show me anybody hitting for a good average. I couldn't put Berra in there. The young fellow hasn't been hitting. I changed them once and it didn't work out."

Stengel was fully dressed in his uniform when Ford Frick, in his first act as newly-elected commissioner, called off the game at 11:23 A.M. (EST).

It was the first rainout in the series since 1941 when the third Dodger-Yank game at Brooklyn was postponed. The Yanks and Giants had a wet time in 1936, finishing the first game in a heavy storm and calling off the second.

PUSHED BACK
As is customary in all series, tickets for game No. 4 will be honored today and the entire schedule will be pushed back a day. They'll play at the Polo Grounds again Tuesday. If it isn't over then, they will return to the Stadium Wednesday and Thursday.

The Giants all showed up at the park because they had a meeting to decide how they'd split the series cash. They can't announce what they did until the commissioner approves the division. Only a few of the Yanks came up town,

Ford Frick, newly-elected commissioner, announced yesterday Segar's appointment to the post formerly held by Walter Multry and temporarily filled by George Denham.

Veeck Signs Hornsby

Rogers To Run Browns

NEW YORK, (AP)—Rogers Hornsby signed to manage the St. Louis Browns for three years. Owner Bill Veeck announced today. No financial terms were disclosed except that Hornsby's salary will be the greatest ever paid a Browns manager. Hornsby came east for the World Series from Seattle, where he managed the Pacific Coast league entry the past season. He managed the Browns briefly during the '30's and starred both as a manager and a player with the Cardinals, St. Louis' National league team.

THREE OFFERS
When Hornsby left the coast on his series trip he said he was considering three offers to return to the majors. None was identified.

Hornsby replaces Zack Taylor as manager of the Browns. When Veeck, the dynamic redhead who startled the baseball world with his crowd-catching methods while directing the Cleveland Indians, took over control of the Browns in mid-season he indicated he would probably seek a new manager.

Taylor has been promised a job with the Browns' organization but has not indicated whether he will accept.

IMMORTAL
Hornsby, a member of the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, is one of baseball's immortals. In his major league career, which started in 1915, he won the National league batting championship six times in a row, starting with 1920 when he had an average of .370. In 1924 he resched the amazing batting mark of .424.

In his long career as a second baseman, he served in turn with the Cardinals, Giants, Braves and Cubs in the National league and the Browns in the American league. He was player-manager of the Cardinals in 1925, and in 1926 led the Cardinals to the pennant. Since 1937, when he was released by the Browns, Hornsby has been active in both major and minor league baseball.
