Oregon State NW Grid Hope

Junior in the University of Washington football barracks were sweeping up the pieces of shattered hope today while Oregon State's warriors took a look at their bells and prepared to carry on the northwest bid for a berth in the Rose Bowl.

Labeled a dark horse in the Pacific Coast conference pennant chase, Southern California walked over Washington with iron shoes Saturday to earn a 20-13 victory and this praise from losing coach Howie Odell: "Greatest team I've ever seen since I came west—and that includes Notre Dame."

While the air buzzed out of the Washington balloon, Oregon State's Beavers rolled to an expected 34-6 triumph over Idaho in their conference opener. Stanford, the only other team to own a conference victory, rolled over Michigan 23-13 to give Far West prestige an unexpected boost.

BEARS ROLL

California, the perennial champion and looming once more as the titlist, munched Minnesota 45-14. UCLA took a week off to post its first victory, beating Santa Clara 44-17.

Oregon, which gave Stanford a memorable scare two weeks ago, fell before College of Pacific 34-6 in a game at Stockton, Calif. Hal Dunham pitched a 28-yard pass to Tommy Edwards for the only Oregon score.

Coach Forrest Evashevski, whose USC Cougars whipped Oklahoma A. M. Friday night, was in the scouting box Saturday as Southern California upset the Huskies of Washington.

Even a 100-yard touchdown punt return by Hugh McElhenney to tie score at 13-13 couldn't quench the USC fire. The teams had swapped touchdowns in the second period after long, bruising drives.

Troy scored in a short plunge, Washington on a Dean Rockey-Bill Earley pass good for 37 yards.

With the clock winding out the final half-minute of the first half, the Trojans pulled off the play that set them on the victory trail. Den Schneider lofted a pass to Scooter Cutri and when the little receiver was hauled down the play had netted 57 yards. It left Troy only two yards and two plays from a touchdown, the gun sounding as Jim Sears boomed over.

HOLD HUSKIES
Washington's big chance to take charge was pushed in the face when USC held for four downs inside its own 4-yard stripe in the third period, finally taking over on its own six-inch line.

McElhenney's long run with Des Koch's punt at the start of the final period thrilled the crowd of 47,000 but Washington didn't have the strength left to fight back Troy's final surge. Three passes and two short line plays carried USC 75 yards to its winning touchdown.

Idaho gave Oregon State a fright with a first-quarter touchdown, to trail by only 7 to 6, then was snowed under as sophomore Dave Mann tossed two touchdown aeriels in the second period and caught one himself from Gene Morrow.

PAYES WAY
Bill West plucked an Idaho aerial to set up the score for OBC in the third quarter and the last stanza was scoreless. An interception by Jim Cordial also had given the Beavers their first tally of the game.

Morrow caught one of Mann's scoring passes and the other was a toss to Dwane Helbig. Idaho's tally also came via the air, Wayne Anderson throwing to Jerry Ogle.

Dressen Will Stay in '52

NEW YORK, AP—Charlie Dressen, whose Brooklyn club blew a 12-1 game in seven weeks to lose the National League pennant to the New York Giants, will manage the Dodgers in 1952, the Associated Press learned today.

A top Dodger official revealed today Brooklyn held an organizational meeting last Saturday in which all the Dodger brass, except Pres. Walter O'Malley, attended.

The official, who asked not to be identified, said the announcement of the re-hiring of Dressen for next year will be made "four or five days after the end of the World Series."
