

### Gurney Death Speeds Attack

SINGAPORE, (U) — British High Commissioner Sir Henry Gurney, slain by a Communist on a jungle road, was buried today as a British hero.

In Kuala Lumpur thousands of the peninsula's Chinese, Indians, Malays, Eurasians and Europeans watched in silence as Sir Henry's body was carried to a grave beside those of planters, miners and police who also died at the hands of Communist terrorists in the jungle.

Five and a half companies of British and Gurkha troops meanwhile sought the Communist band which ambushed the 53-year-old Gurney and his wife Saturday north of Kuala Lumpur as they drove with an escort to a hill resort for a weekend.

The air force made intensive air strikes in the area.

Michael Hogan, temporarily administering Malaya's government, said the war on the Red terrorists would be pressed with increased bitterness and intensity.

Since June, 1948, the war with the Communists has resulted in 10,000 persons killed, wounded or listed as missing on both sides. The British have battled some 2000 to 5000 Reds in the jungle with more than 100,000 Malayan police and 40,000 troops.

Sir Henry, determined leader of the British fight against the Communists as their No. 1 enemy.

## Senate Chiefs Speed Action, Seek Adjournment by October 20

### Rail Agent's Kindness Backfires

TAMPA, Fla., (U) — Railway express agent Bert Willard was just trying to make a sick boy happy, instead he started a cat fight.

The cat, pet of 11-year-old Chuck Hildebrand, escaped here while being expressed from Elmira, N. Y., to Bradenton, Fla., new home of the Hildebrands.

Mrs. Lorna Hildebrand phoned Willard that Chuck was sick and calling for his pet. The agent redoubled efforts to locate the elusive kitty, finally recovered it and paid a little girl \$5 reward.

Was Chuck happy? Not Chuck. He had become attached to another cat.

Did Mrs. Hildebrand rejoice? Not Mrs. Hildebrand. The two cats have been fighting since they first met.

And was Willard happy? Not Willard. He's out \$5 and a lot of time and didn't make Chuck happy after all.

WASHINGTON, (U) — Leaders opened a senate drive for early adjournment today by invoking speedy approval of three bills involving the spending of more than \$65,000,000,000 (B).

Democratic Leader McFarland of Arizona outlined this ambitious program for his colleagues:

1. A compromise \$56,937,808,030 (B) defense money bill supporting operating funds for the army, navy, air force and marines.

2. A compromise foreign aid measure authorizing a \$7,483,000,000 (B) program of economic and military assistance abroad.

3. A new \$1,751,196,791 (B) catch-all money bill carrying funds for more than a score of government agencies, including those handling economic controls and civil defense.

Originally there had been talk that congress could wind up the session this weekend, but McFarland is now hoping for adjournment October 20. Even that date appeared optimistic.

All three of the pending senate bills are on McFarland's "must" list. Senate approval, which seemed certain, would send two of them to the president's desk.

The house, generally further along with its work, turned today to a bill already passed by the senate to cut down on the maximum size and weight of parcel post packages.

The only point in the foreign aid bill which the senate has not already approved is the deletion by the house of a provision giving the new administrator of foreign aid a place on the board of directors of the export-import bank.

Chairman Maybank (D-S) of the senate banking committee objected to this provision when the bill went through the senate. He forecast senate acceptance of the house decision.

Funds for actual operation of the foreign aid program must be provided in a separate money bill, still being drafted by a house appropriations subcommittee.

The huge defense spending bill, largest of this session and biggest military money measure in peace time history, contains more than 20 billion dollars for the air force, slightly less than that for the army and nearly 16 billions for navy and marine corps.

A special fund of \$1,000,000,000 (B) is earmarked for expansion of air power, two thirds of it for the air force and one third for the navy and marine air arms.

The third bill—the \$1,751,196,791 supplemental measure — represents an increase of nearly \$165,000,000 to amounts voted by the house.

The senate appropriations committee added more than \$60,000,000 (M) to operating funds for such activities as price-wage-rent controls. It also tacked on more the \$30,000,000 (M) funds for the civil defense administration, recommending \$97,535,000 (M). Pres. Truman had asked for \$535,000,000 (M).
