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Judge Charged In Food Fraud

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The labor department has accused a Texan county judge of feeding Mexican farm workers canned meat imported as "dog food" — unfit for human consumption. The department has canceled his contract to feed and house them.

The judge, R. E. Bibb, Maverick county, could not be reached for comment. The labor department said he is a prominent businessman and chairman of the Democratic county committee.

It cancelled, effective November 1, a contract under which Bibb provided food and housing at Eagle Pass, Texas, for Mexicans brought into this country to do farm work. Eagle Pass is one of five such centers the government maintains to care for the Mexicans until they are placed in jobs.

Undersecretary of Labor Michael J. Galvin said Bibb had served the Mexican migratory workers meat from Mexico which had cleared customs labeled "animal food" and invoiced "dog food— unfit for human consumption."

The labels were removed after the food cleared customs and before it was served, Galvin said. He added that during the remainder of Bibb's contract, a U.S. public health service inspector will be stationed at Eagle Pass to inspect all food at each meal.

The department said Bibb had bought some 2000 cases of the meat, the duty on which was considerably less than that on meat intended for human consumption.

Chairman Mahon (D-Tex.) described the release as "outrageous."

SOUTHPORT, Conn., (AP)—Actor Edward Arnold, who impersonates American presidents on the radio, plans to take his new bride to Washington today or tomorrow for a visit with Pres. Truman.

Arnold, 61, was married here yesterday to the former Mrs. Cloe

McCain, 43, of Detroit. The couple said they would go to Puerto Rico after visiting Truman. They then will return to New York for Arnold's radio and television engagements.

Only 16 close friends attended the ceremony on the estate here of Frederick Olse, Arnold's cousin. The Rev. Galen Russell, of the Southport Congregational church, officiated.

It was the third wedding for Arnold, the second for his wife. Arnold said they would make

their permanent home at a ranch near East Highland, Calif.

OHlsen CONTINUES PORTLAND, (AP)—Thomas L. Ohlsen will continue as milk marketing administrator for another year. His appointment, subject to the approval of the state retirement board, was announced by the state board of agriculture Saturday. State retirement board approval is necessary because Ohlsen is past 65.

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
