OTI MEETS BOISE JC BRONCS

Medford Favored In 39th Tiff With Pels

The Pelicans of Klamath Falls and the Black Tornado of Medford make their 39th grid curtain call Friday night on Modoc field at 8 p.m.

Comparative scores—not always an accurate yardstick—favor Medford strongly.

But past performances usually are tucked away in the dressing room when these two traditional gridiron rivals clash.

In the 38 meetings, Medford has won 28 times, Klamath Falls six times.

FOUR TIES
There have been four deadlocks, including last year's 7-7 knot.

But strictly for the sake of comparison, here's how the Pels and Tornadoes fared against common foes.

Medford whacked Eugene, 34-6; Klamath Falls lost to the Axemen, 20-12. Medford blanked Roseburg, 20-0; Klamath Falls beat the Indians, 26-12.

Medford goes into the game with a 3-1 record. Its only loss was to a surprisingly strong Marshfield eleven, 13-0. In addition to Eugene and Roseburg, the Black Tornado whipped Vancouver, Wash., 20-0.

Contrariwise, the Pels have just one win in four starts, the conquest of Roseburg. They've lost to Grant (27-7) and Primeville (12-7) besides the Eugene loss last week when the Axemen found a scoring punch through the air for two scores in the last quarter.

TALLY TOWNS
Medford has real touchdown twins—Don and Ron Spinas. Ron, a junior, plays right half and fullback. Senior Don is the regular right halfback.

The game marks the first league outing for both teams in the three-team A-16 district.

Grants Pass, the third team in the district, is highly favored to walk off with the bunting. The Cavemen have topped the weekly Associated Press high school poll all season.

The Pels go into the game in virtually full health. Doug Campbell is nursing a bad ankle suffered in the Eugene game but the defensive tackle should be ready by gametime.

End Ray Bell is fighting a cold but it's not serious.

PASS DEFENSE
The Pelicans will be working on pass defense this week. Jack Honkel, Eugene quarterback, beat them with passes, bringing from Assistant Pel Coach Dutch French this compliment . . . "a better passer than Wally Russell or George Shaw."

The Pels stopped Eugene cold on the ground and that department isn't giving the KU coaching staff too much worry.

The Bill Pickett-to-Ray Bell pass combo worked for a touchdown against Eugene and Coach Bob Heidershott may give this pair a chance to go all out against Medford.

Ken Young ran wild against the Axemen and he'll be given the go-ahead signal Friday night when the Pels aim for an upset.

Pels Stage Funeral March for Medford

The Medford football team will be burned in effigy tomorrow night after a colorful parade launches an impressive Klamath Falls pre-game rally on the eve of the traditional Pelican-Black Tornado game.

The parade, bonfire and rally is sponsored jointly by the K club, rally squad and Pep-Peppers of KUHS.

The parade starts at 7 p.m. at the courthouse, proceeds to Alameda, then left to the bonfire on Kit Carson near the north entrance.

Eleven coffins (carrying the "members" of Medford's first team) will be thrown into the fire after the "funeral procession."

The big "K" on K-hill will burn brightly during the parade. Railroad fuses have been borrowed to light up the "K."

Endicott Quits; Owls Travel for Grid Tilt

The Oregon Tech Owls travel over 400 miles this week for a football date with a 1950 Little Rose Bowl team.

The Owls go against the Boise Junior college Broncos with their wings slightly singed after last Friday's 19-6 setback by the Oregon College Wolves.

It's the fourth pigskin venture for the Owls, who go into the game with a 2-2 record.

Last year the Broncos, riding on the crest of a 34-game win streak and headed for the Little Rose Bowl, smashed Oregon Tech 53-6 on Modoc field.

But Boise lost to Long Beach JC in the annual Little Rose Bowl classic and this season have dropped an 18-6 decision to Olympic JC in Bremerton, Wash., in three starts.

VICTORIES
Victories include a 27-19 win over John Muir of Pasadena, Calif., and a 39-0 lacing handed Rick College of Rexburg, Idaho.

The Owls were handed a defensive blow this week when tackle Jim Endicott quit school. Endicott, an Albany boy, was a bulwark on defense.

Although the Owls came out of the slam-bang OCE game with lumps, no serious injuries were incurred and, barring accidents during practice sessions this week, will go into the Boise game at full strength.

Halfback Merlin Howard, who handed the Owls a load of jitters

with his sparkling runs last year, is back with Boise, as is fullback Dwight Winslow, a 185-pounder.

Howard also does most of the passing.

READY
Oregon Tech's Big Three in the scout department—Don Foreman, Larry Jeter and Len Genetti—are ready to go. If Harry Thompson, high stepper from Steubenville, O., is ready, the Owls will have a running attack that could hand the Broncos their second defeat of the season.

Thompson's leg injury has hindered him all season.

Ezz Meets Rex Layne Tonight

PITTSBURGH, Pa. — Ezzard Charles, confident he'll be the first fighter ever to regain the heavyweight boxing title, gets his first big test in stocky Rex Layne tonight in a 12-round bout at Forbes Field.

Both were knocked out in their last fights. Charles lost his heavyweight crown to aging Jersey Joe Walcott via a seven round knockout. Layne was flattened by Rocky Marciano in six rounds.

Charles predicts he'll win. So does Layne. But neither will commit themselves how they intend doing it. Both blame overwork for their poor showings in July.

CORVALLIS, Ore. — Oregon State will be in top shape for Saturday's Pacific Coast conference mix with Southern California, says Coach Kip Taylor. OSC will be seeking its 9th win over USC in 26 starts in the Saturday game at Los Angeles.

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Cannamela, Little Picked As Linemen of Week in AP Poll

NEW YORK, N.Y. — Pat Cannamela, Southern California guard, and Jack Little, Texas A&M tackle, were picked today as the Linemen of the Week in the first Associated Press linemen poll for the 1951 football season.

Cannamela gained defensive honors for his work in helping to stop the University of Washington in an important Pacific Coast conference game at Seattle. Little took the offensive laurels for his sterling play against Oklahoma at College Station, Tex.

WENT WEST
Cannamela is an eastern boy from New London, Conn., who went west to gain grid fame. The 200-pound senior co-captain of USC was the spearhead of a line that held the powerful Washington backs to a net of 72 yards from rushing, a potent factor in USC's 20-13 victory.

Little, playing 50 minutes on both offensive and defensive in the Aggie's 14-7 triumph over Oklahoma, was very effective in opening holes in the Sooner line.

Gene Mosler, Tennessee center, and Tom Harlan, Pennsylvania end, received high praise in the voting.

OTHERS
Other linemen nominated were craters Dick Hightower, Southern Methodist; Hugh Meyer, Texas A&M; Tom Hugo, Denver; George Tarnasovic, Louisiana State; tackles Bill "Pug" Pearson, Tennessee; and Bob Evans, Pennsylvania, and guards Harley Sewell, Texas, and Les Richter, California.

Meantime, in the first back of the week poll, top honors went to George "Dusty" Rice, of Iowa. He gained the award for his feat of scoring three touchdowns against Purdue on runs of 100, 60 and 88 yards.



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
