# Yanks 9-5 Favorites To Close Out World Series Play Today

NEW YORK, (AP)—Flexing their muscles after the 13-1 slaughter at the Polo Grounds, the aroused New York Yankees closed in for the kill today with Vic Raschi (21-10) primed to face Dave Koslo (10-9) of the Giants in the sixth World Series game at Yankee stadium.

Once more Leo Durocher's desperate Giants had their backs to the wall, a most familiar position. Trailing 3-2 in games, they couldn't afford to lose any more and the Yanks were 9 to 5 favorites to close it out in six.

Against Brooklyn in the playoff the Giants bounced back in the dramatic finale. But they seem to have lost their bounce since Sunday's rainy interruption.

Durocher chose Koslo, a 31-year-old left-hander, for his door-to-door effort. He gambled and won with Dave against Allie Reynolds in the opening game at the stadium. Passing up Jim Hearn, the third game winner, he pinned his hopes on Koslo to keep them popping up in the spacious Yankee home park.

If Koslo can do it again, the Giants will have a fighting chance for survival. If he fails they can pack up and go back home to dream of Bobby Thomson's payoff homer in the playoffs.

Much of the sheen of Thomson's famous homer was rubbed off yesterday in the Giants final Polo Grounds appearance. Gregory and numbered after a 12-hit Yankee bombing that included a grand slam homer by rookie Gil McDougald and a "Chinese" homer by little Phil Rizzuto, they surrendered miserably.

WALKS HURT

Lopat was plenty cute yesterday, sprinkling five hits. Only one lineer reached second base against the chunky little fellow with the easy motion after the first inning. Irvin ran his hit total to 11, one short of the record, and was robbed of the 12th by Gene Woodling's fine running catch in the ninth. Dark's two hits boosted his total to nine. Wes Westrum's double was the only other hit.

Now, with a third straight series victory within his grasp, Mer Case Stengel decided to send Rizzuto after the big one. Vic, a husky right-hander, was knocked out in the fifth inning Saturday when Jim Hearn stopped the Yanks. With three days rest, he's anxious to get even with the Giants.

Judging from yesterday's final score, you never would think the Giants once led. But they did 1-0 at the end of the first on singles by Dark and Irvin and an error by Woodling.

DiMaggio's single following two walks tied the score early in the third. After an intentional walk to Johnny Mize loaded the bases, McDougald unloaded them with a homer into the upper left field seats.

# BASEBALL PROBING ON AGAIN MONDAY

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Baseball will hop from the World Series back into a congressional investigation. Ernest Goldstein, counsel for a house judiciary subcommittee, told a reporter today the investigation, which was begun last July will resume Monday.

Chief among those to be heard: the players. They didn't have their say in the summer hearing because the subcommittee didn't want to interfere with their playing.

Chairman Celler (D-NY) has asked Joe DiMaggio and Phil Rizzuto of the New York Yankees, Freddie Hutchinson of the Detroit Tigers and Peewee Reese of the Brooklyn Dodgers to testify.

Mickey Owen and Danny Garella, a couple of players who jumped to the Mexican league, also have been asked to drop around and give their side of the baseball story.

Others besides players who have been asked to appear: Clark Griffith, president of the Washington Senators; Taylor Spink of "The Sporting News"; Leslie O'Connor, right hand man for the late Judge K. M. Landis while he was baseball commissioner; P. K. Wrigley, president of the Chicago Cubs; and Branch Rickey, general manager of the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The investigation has run along these lines:

1. Is baseball violating anti-trust laws?
2. If so, should congress exempt it from prosecution?

Mostly, the committee heard from the baseball management. One of the chief witnesses, for example, was Ford Frick, then head of the National league, but since named baseball commissioner.

To the surprise of practically no one, all these witnesses came out strongly for leaving baseball exactly as it is.
