## Grain Market Weak Today

CHICAGO, (AP)—Aside from a short-lived burst of buying in corn, the grain market failed to show any strength today. Wheat held fairly steady while oats, soybeans and lard slumped.

Oats lagged on fears that more cash bids delivered on October contracts at Winnipeg would be shipped to this country. More than 8,000,000 (M) bushels have now been delivered, presumably to American interests.

Wheat closed 1/4-1/2 higher, December \$2.47-\$2.48, corn 1/2 to 1 cent higher, December \$1.77-1/4, oats 1/2 lower to 1/4 higher, December 87 1/2, rye (new style) unchanged to 1/2 lower, December \$1.82-\$1.82 1/2, soybeans 1/2 to 2 cents lower, November \$2.85-1/2, and lard 15 cents to 10 cents a hundred pounds higher, October \$16.45.

## Stocks Quietly Drift Down

NEW YORK, (AP)—The stock market moved quietly lower today with occasional mild attempts at recovery. Prices were down by a little more than 2 points at the most among leaders while scattered gains were fractional.

The volume of business dwindled to an estimated 1,200,000 shares as compared with 1,700,000 shares yesterday. Low-priced shares and surges of narrow trading from time to time, and the cheerless gold stocks were prominent.

Rails and steels were the two major groups on the downside most of the session, and they were in the forefront of a late afternoon upward movement that recovered a considerable portion of the early group decline.

American Cyanamid was a standout on the upside. It opened on a block of 700 shares, up 1/2 at 11 1/2, and within a short time it gained a little more than 2 points.
