

### German Tells Klamathites Interesting U. S. Habits

Dr. Gerhart Seger, former German legislator and editor of a German language newspaper in the U.S. during world war exposed to members of the Klamath knife and fork club at the Willard last night some things about their country that most were willing to admit they hadn't known before.

Speaking on "What Makes America Tick," Dr. Seger gave listeners a look at America and Americans through the eyes of foreigners observing this country.

Perhaps the greatest difference between the American and European philosophies, he said, is the American's conception of fairness.

"There is no word for 'fairness,'" he said, "in any of the six European languages I speak. They have no such concept.

Politicians in America call their political foes "opponents," he said. Yet they call Russia an enemy. Dr. Seger noted that this was one of the most difficult things for foreigners to understand.

In Europe, he said, a politician hasn't got one good word to say about or to his opponent. In the U.S. an electioneering politician generally is willing to concede good points about his opponent in every department but his politics.

The speaker, an editor himself, struck out at the American newspapers and press services for fail-

ing to print the good facts in the American occupation government of Germany. There are always mistakes made, he said, and that's all that gets to the people over the occupation forces have done here.

"MAGNIFICENT"  
On the whole, Dr. Seger said the occupation forces have done a "magnificent" job in Germany. He applauded the American constitution as one of the basic reasons for America's secure ticking away for nearly 200 years.

"America is a young nation," he said, "but it is one of the world's oldest democracies." The doctor noted that even Germany's constitution dates back only to 1919, and that the American constitution preceded even the principles behind the French revolution.

Knif and Fork Pres. Russ Tisdale introduced Dr. E. Dirsche, who in turn introduced the speaker. "I leave you with one happy thought," Dr. Seger said in concluding his talk which saw a fifteen minute question and answer period. "Hitler is dead."

### Alaskan Fire Damage High

CORDOVA, Alaska, (AP)—This Prince William sound fishing community was without a theater today and many of its residents were homeless in the wake of a \$500,000 business district fire.

The fire swept through three buildings, including the theater, early yesterday and threatened the entire downtown district before Cordova firemen and firefighters from the civil aeronautics administration station at Mile 13 brought it under control.

Firemen said the blaze apparently started when the furnace in the Imperial building overheated or exploded. The flames quickly spread to the adjoining Evans building and Raynor apartments.

Occupants of the Raynor apartment building were evacuated safely but many were left without clothes or bedding and lost all their personal belongings.

Mr. and Mrs. Charles Evans, who lived in the back of their store in the Evans building, were nearly trapped. Firemen helped Mrs. Evans through a back window, however, and Evans crawled on his hands and knees out the front of the building.
