## Crop Report Lowers Corn

CHICAGO, (AP)—A government crop report which didn't lower the corn forecast as much as the trade had expected provided a background for falling corn prices today. Splendid weather for drying out the crop helped the decline.

Most of the other sections of the market slumped, although soybeans showed some flashes of strength.

## Buying Ends Stocks' Downward Trend

NEW YORK, (AP)—Generous buying surges through one section of the stock market after another but prices barely today after a two-day decline.

Advances among the leaders carried to around 2 points at the best with a few higher-priced issues going considerably higher and lower issues usually held down below a point.

The volume of business expanded to an estimated 1,200,000 shares as compared with 1,320,000 shares traded yesterday.

Radio-television issues were the first to show signs of life, and they advanced markedly. By the time their vigor was spent, steels and aircraft came to life with the rails joining in substantially.

Low-priced issues of all types were in demand but the price pattern in this class of securities was somewhat narrowly mixed.

In the late afternoon the motion picture division posted sharp advances all along the line. Utilities held steady to higher all day.

Motors were up but not active.
