CAUGHT In The ROUNDS

Most everyone has been well aware of the forest fire danger this dry season, what with hesitation on the deer season and all. There are other fire hazards though, which claim about 10,000 American lives each year, which know no season. To focus attention on this menace, we have Fire Prevention Week, this week.

Fire Chief Roy Rowe, following the long established custom of his predecessor, Keith Ambrose, is spending the week talking to school children, reminding them of the dangers of fire and telling them how the fires of carelessness can be avoided.

We'll let him talk in this column then on fire prevention. This text is all his.

"Every year 300,000 or more homes are damaged by fire. Last year alone we burned \$588,400,000 worth of property—homes, stores, office buildings, warehouses, factories, etc.

"In the unnecessary and wasteful fires that ravage the United States, every year, however, 10,000 persons die for nothing. Nobody is benefited. We haven't proved anything by these deaths or left the world better. These people died because someone forgot to put out a cigarette before he threw it away—because someone failed to keep a stove free of soot—because

someone allowed a bunch of oily rags to collect in the closet—because someone was just too lazy to be a little careful.

"Somehow the American people—all of us—must be made to understand the toll that daily carelessness habits take. So in this one week, every Fall we make an effort on every level to study how we must best reduce the number of needless fires.

"More than any other national problem this is a matter of individual responsibility. The carelessness of one person may threaten the lives and property of many others. It is up to each of us to face the fact of our own negligence.

"We could eliminate almost one-third of all the fires in this country if we were careful of how we handled cigarettes and matches—another twenty percent if we had repaired them promptly on chimneys, stoves, furnaces and other heating appliances—another eleven percent if we did not overload and misuse electricity.

"If we make our homes safer from fire in peacetime, they will be better prepared to cope with fire in any emergency. A fire safety conscious community is going to have stronger defenses against any possible enemy. There lies the lesson of Fire Prevention Week observances today."

NEW YORK. (AP)—Christmas came too early this year for the merchants—Christmas buying, to be exact.

If love and generosity don't overwhelm the buying public this year, it'll be a sad thing indeed. Merchants have been plagued for a long time now with over-stuffed inventories, with buying reluctance on the part of the public, rising prices, and finally by a late fall. Most retailers say they expect a good Christmas trade. They may not reach the record totals of last Christmas, however, since the 1950 yuletide was marked by the first spurt of the second round of war-scare buying. Poppa-bought Momma deep-freeze for Christmas because he was thoroughly convinced there wouldn't be any to buy come March 1. Alas, he was getting credit for a loving spirit. Christmas time in buying something she was going to make him buy anyhow.

This year, retail trade probably will look the best, in comparison with last year, during October and November. People used up their cash in the summer of 1950 on sugar, sheets and nylon, saved up during October and November, and then in December sold their savings bonds to buy household gadgets and cars.

WASHINGTON. (AP)—The Democrats and Republicans, sensitive to the size of the Negro vote in northern cities, made promises about putting through civil rights legislation if they won the 1948 election.

But the whole subject of civil rights in congress, where the Democrats won and have held a majority since 1948, has been pretty dead except for a brief but unsuccessful flurry by the Trumanites in 1949.

When the attempt was made two years ago the Southern Democrats as they had in the past and will do again, broke away from their Northern Democratic brothers and filibustered the move to death.

There were at the time some critics who felt the Trumanites' attempt was feeble to begin with and that they could have smashed the filibuster if they had tried hard enough.

At any rate nothing much has been said about civil rights since the time. But now some talk, but only talk so far, about civil rights is beginning again. It can be expected to pick up.

This is not unusual. We are moving into another election year when both parties once again will hold pre-election conventions and once again undoubtedly make promises about civil rights if they're elected.

COURT
It will be indeed unusual if they make good on the promises. It has been this way for years. And there's no reason to believe it won't continue like that.

Meanwhile it has been the supreme court, not congress, which has actually been doing something about civil rights. It has been widening them by court decisions. The court can't legislate but its decisions have the effect of legislation.

But to understand what's cooking now, and eventually may be the cause of a lot of dispute in congress, here is a little background.

A filibuster simply means talk without limit. A filibuster is an attempt by a member of congress or a group of members, to talk so long against some measure that the others will give up trying to pass it. In short, a filibuster is an effort to block legislation by talking.

The Doctor Says---

In recent months the newspapers have been filled with hair-raising accounts of youngsters who have become addicted to drugs, and of huge dope rings run by the scum of society.

This is, indeed, one of our most serious problems and it is worth remembering also that during and before the last war, it was the favored policy of the Japanese government to spread the dope habit among the Chinese as one method of degrading and debasing them.

Addition to drugs is believed to be caused by human weakness and not by the drugs themselves. It is a "symptom" of a personality maladjustment rather than a disease in its own right.

The usual meaning when speaking of the "drug habit" is that the person has developed an excessive craving or desire to take one of the substances derived from opium, such as heroin or morphine.

Marijuana, about which so much has been written, is not an opium derivative, however, and is generally believed not to cause addiction in its own right, but rather to lead towards a desire later on for one of the opium and habit-forming substances.

The opium derivatives cannot be taken too long without causing undesirable effects. Larger and larger amounts become needed in order to produce the desired relief or feeling of well-being.

The symptoms of the opium or morphine habit come on gradually. For months the health may be little disturbed. The dose of the drug, however, has to be constantly increased. Once the habit is well-formed, the victim feels mentally depressed and is likely to suffer from vague symptoms in the stomach or bowels whenever the effect of a dose has worn off.

The confirmed addict becomes thin, prematurely gray, and develops a sallow, pasty complexion. When not under the influence of the drug, irritability and restlessness are common. Sleep may be disturbed; appetite and digestion upset; death comes early.

There are thousands of people who have this unfortunate habit—no one knows just how many. Since the legal distribution of opium, morphine, and their relatives is carefully controlled, illegal smuggling of these drugs, opium rings, dope peddlers, and many other undesirable practices have developed to satisfy the addicts.

Military Affairs

WASHINGTON. (AP)—The use of atomic weapons in Korea was reported today to have been given serious consideration by U.S. military leaders but to have been laid aside for the present.

The question of using such weapons was one of the reasons for the recent hurried trip to Tokyo and the bathroom by Gen Omar Bradley, a well-informed government source told a reporter.

Bradley recommended against use of A-bombs at this time because he regarded the prospects for a Korean truce as brighter, said this source, who declined to be quoted by name.

Bradley, in addition to being chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, is by law the principal military adviser of the president. Thus, it may be presumed that recommendation was conveyed to Pres. Truman who, by terms of the atomic energy act, is the final authority for use of the bomb by the armed forces.

At a news conference last November 30, the president said there has always been active consideration of the A-bomb's use but that he did not want to see it used because it is a terrible weapon.

In addition to whatever political policies may have entered the current decision to hold atomic weapons in leash pending further true negotiations, military consideration probably were involved.

If there is indeed an improved chance for a cease-fire agreement, it might be undesirable to give the Communists a demonstration of the technique of applying atomic weapons tactically in a battlefield. The value of that could be greater later if there is all-out direct war with Russia.

There appears to be little doubt that the United States can use atomic weapons on the battlefield as well as against distant enemy cities.

Perhaps by coincidence, Gordon Dean, chairman of the atomic energy commission, was making some pretty definitive statements on the subject both before Bradley he did not connect them with the Bradley mission or the Korean war.

Testifying before a congressional appropriations subcommittee on September 21, a week before the general start for the Far East, Dean said the United States has a "very impressive" capability of men in the field, and against military targets. Of the bomb stockpile, he said "we have many today that are deliverable, a very impressive number."

Then on October 5, a day after Bradley had returned, Dean made an unusually frank public address in New Angeles in which he spoke of the progress in atomic weapon design and development. During

KANSAS CITY, (AP)—The Canby, Ore., chapter of the future farmers of America won a \$200 award here Wednesday night, being named among regional winners in a fair safety project. The award was presented at the annual FFA convention here.
