Soviet Guns Stir Japanese

TOKYO, (P) — Soviet gunfire on the Hokkaido islands off Hokkaido's eastern tip has created mounting fears among Japanese, a national police reserve officer said.

Makoto Yamada, head of the police reserve's Sapporo district headquarters, said Soviet searchlights light up homes on the eastern peninsula of Japan's northern island.

Police reserves are training with bazookas and mortars in Hokkaido's interior to avoid provoking Russian patrol craft, Yamada disclosed.

He said the issuance of heavier weapons to the police reserves has not related to difficulties with the Russians.

Kids Cheer Royal Party

CORNWALL, Ont., (P) — Thousands of flag-waving children sent up a shrill cheer today as Prince Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh arrived for a 15-minute visit opening the Ontario part of their tour of Canada.

Looking refreshed and relaxed despite two long days of official functions in the federal capital at Ottawa and an overnight train trip of 75 miles, the royal couple stepped to the station platform to acknowledge the cheers of about 20,000, mostly children.

Elizabeth and Philip did not leave the newly-painted, flag-decked station.

The couple began this whistle-stop tour of Ontario after a night of square dancing for which Elizabeth wore a peasant blouse and dirndl skirt. Today she went back to her fancy clothes.

The princess whirled and reeled to country tunes at Ottawa's government house after a buffet supper attended by 70 friends of the governor general, Viscount Alexander, and his wife.
