Output Said Curbing Farm Prices

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Those farm leaders who oppose government price controls claim that this year's big crops support their argument that production is the most effective weapon against inflation. At planting time last spring, the general level of prices farmers were receiving for all crops combined was 271 percent of the 1909-14 average. The level had climbed about 20 percent in a year—a period in which there were short supplies of some crops and an increased demand under the defense program.

Monteux Leaving San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Pierre Monteux, 76-year-old conductor, is leaving the San Francisco symphony orchestra next May after 17 seasons. The short, mustachioed Frenchman who has won international acclaim and raised the San Francisco orchestra to national fame, is not retiring. He will conduct at Cincinnati's music festival in May and at the Berlin festival next September. Between the two dates he will tour South America as a guest conductor.

What has happened to prices? Once the crops were sown, prices started weakening. Month by month during the season they declined. Now, at harvest time, the general level of crop prices is 12 percent lower than last spring. Only a few crops are bringing as much as a few more now than they did in the spring—potatoes, sweet potatoes, tobacco, apples, grapefruit and lemons. In the cases where prices are higher, smaller crops or market supplies are indicated.

TOP CROPS

Only two crops, cotton and sweet potatoes, are bringing as much as their parity prices—prices which under farm law are declared to be equally fair to farmers and those who buy their products. Advocates of price controls generally agree that big production

does help control prices. But they contend authority to apply ceilings should be available in the event production falls and prices start skyrocketing. It is true that a large class of farm products has gone up a little since spring. In this class are livestock and livestock products. The general level of livestock prices has increased nearly two percent. Opponents of price controls say the rise in livestock prices, like the decline in crop prices, bears out their argument that production is the best price control device.

Lower livestock output is sharply lower than in the spring season. Milk production is lower. So is egg output. Fewer beef cattle are being sold. Hence livestock and livestock product prices are higher. But, price control foes say, the same thing will happen in the

case of livestock products that has happened to crops. The temporary high prices, they argue, will encourage greater production, which in turn will bring about lower prices.

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Seward Finds Lost Cannon

SEWARD, Alaska, (AP)—The nation's cannon hunters were called off today, Seward's missing cannon of Russian vintage has been found—at the bottom of a trash heap, thanks to a shamefaced businessman's confession.

Seward officials started a search for the weapon—relic of Russian ownership of Alaska—as an aid to celebrations planned for next year. No one had thought much of the disappearance of the cannon from Seward park and few persons realized it was gone. The charitably unnamed businessman confessed yesterday he and three companions swiped it 10 years ago, intending to place it in the high school principal's desk. They were thwarted by the janitor who eventually hid it at the bottom of a 10-foot heap of rubbish and dirt. It was dug up today in good condition and lodged in city jail for safekeeping until the golden anniversary celebration gets under way.

Early Peace Hopes Dim

There is no possibility of peace—not a chance in the world—in the near future, a missionary-war correspondent recently back from Korea told a non-sectarian audience of about 600 at the armory last night. Dr. Bob Pierce, veteran missionary in the Far East and lately accredited as a war correspondent for the National Assoc. of Evangelists, declared that he was not a military strategist nor a political analyst, but that he believes there is no chance for making any agreement of peace with the Communists.

ONE GOAL
The only promise they held unwaveringly is that they're out to rule the world," he declared. "If they stop shooting in Korea, there is already war in Indochina, Burma and the Middle East, just waiting for the spark."

The world is approaching "a quivering conflict between righteousness and unrighteousness, morality and immorality, lust for power and freedom," Dr. Pierce said, and "they don't even call it a war."

The speaker was critical of United States and United Nations policies in Korea and pointed out that while the Korean fighting is still being called an "incident," 14,000 Americans have been killed in the first 15 months, almost twice as many Americans as were killed in the first 15 months of the last world war.

Christianity in Korea has not been banished by war or the Communists, Dr. Pierce declared, and it is prevalent even among North Korean prisoners of war who have set up Bible institutes and churches in prison camps.

LOSSES
He said the United Nations can prove that 439 Christian pastors in Korea have been killed by the Communists and that he himself had seen a mass grave of 1800 persons murdered because of their religion.

At Dr. Pierce said, in the city of Pusan alone in the past year, the impoverished Koreans have built 20 churches.

Officer Saves Aged Mother

NEW YORK, (AP)—Brooklyn Patrolman Frank Munro rescued his 70-year-old mother from their burning home Wednesday by heaving an inner-spring mattress from a second-story window and dropping her onto it. His mother, Mrs. Louis Manno, was treated at the scene for minor arm and leg burns.
