## BRONCOS BOOT ORETECH, 14-6

### Foreman Scampers For Owls

BOISE, Ida. (Special)—Scatback Merin Howard was the whole show as Boise Junior college defeated Oregon Tech last night, 14-6, before 3000 fans.

It was considerably different than last year when the Bronco whacked the Owls, 53-6, on Modoc field.

Howard, the 165-pound Bronco tailback, scored both Boise touchdowns and carried for 190 of Boise's 226 yards.

Don Foreman prevented a blank when he raced 40 yards for Ore-Tech's lone touchdown in the third quarter.

**THREATEN**  
Tech threatened in the first quarter when guard Floyd Prins recovered a fumble on Boise's 31. But the Owls were cut short with a bobble on the six-yard line.

Then Boise generated a drive with Howard fullback Dwight Winslow and halfback Gus Pastos supplying the gas—and Howard scampers over from the four-yard line.

Again in the second period, the Owls threatened with Foreman, Larry Jeter and Len Gennett advancing the ball on sparkling runs to Boise's three-yard line. But the Broncos kicked up a valiant goal line stand there.

**TWO PLAYS**  
In the third, the Owls wouldn't be turned back. Starting on its own 25, Ore-Tech moved to Boise's 40 on two plays, highlighted by Jack Brown's 20-yard pass to Foreman.

Foreman danced over for the score from there. Jeter's kick was wide and Boise held a 7-6 lead until the fourth quarter when Howard went to work again.

Defensive halfback Herb Slazak intercepted an Ore pass on the 35. From there Howard litter-bugged 65 yards for a touchdown. Leland Fowler kicked both Boise's extra points.

### Hornets Punch Husky Team, Tie for Lead

Henry and Main are tied up today in their race for the Klamath County Class B football title, a race that is shaping up for a showdown November 3.

The Mustangs, idle yesterday, saw Henry tie them for the league leadership with a spanking 44-13 win over Merrill.

Both teams now hold a 3-0 record.

In the other game on the county agenda yesterday, the Sacred Heart Trojans bounced Bonanza, 18-7.

Gordon Ramsey opened scoring for Henry, romping to pay dirt from ten yards out in the first quarter.

The Hornets scored three times in the second frame. John Lehto passed to Don Anderson on a 20-yard tally play for the first score.

Mack skipped 75 yards on an end run for the second touchdown.

Lehto brought the halftime score to 25-0 when he sneaked over from his quarterback position for nine yards in the end zone.

Jim DeVore tallied in both the third and fourth quarters, smashing 12 yards through guard in the third frame and intercepting a pass thrown by Bruce Sanders and running 55 yards for the fourth-quarter counter.

Lehto closed out the scoring with a 15-yard touchdown pass to Anderson in the last period. Mack kicked two points after touchdown.

Sacred Heart posted a halftime 12-9 lead over the Antlers, cashing in on Bonanza's fumbles.

Wayne Neubert scored in the first quarter from the three yard line after a 50-yard march.

Gary Thill picked up a Bonanza fumble and cruised 20 yards for the second-quarter score.

Bonanza steamed up a 70-yard march in the third quarter to close the gap to 12-7. Irwin Crume went over from the 20-yard line for the Antlers' only touchdown.

The Trojan line rushed Marlin Wilson's punt in the last quarter and Sacred Heart took over in scoring territory. Pat Pratt rushed to the one-yard line, from where Jim Mahoney bucked over for a score.

### Second-Period Binge Gives KU 13-12 Win

The Klamath Pelican climbed off the football dormat last night, saving their big punch for the one that counted, a 13-12 victory over the heralded Black Tornado of Medford.

A Bill Pickett to Chick Quinowski pass and Pickett's one-yard touchdown squirm, plus Ken Young's valuable right toe spelled Klamath's big 13 points in a second-quarter push—but the bulk of the credit should be spread throughout the team for its vicious tackling and blocking that had Medford rocking back on its heels in the clutches.

The Tornado blew a scare in a jammed crowd of the grid faithful in the last quarter when Dennis Conner cashed in a 74-yard drive with a touchdown dash to his right side from the one-yard line with just four seconds to go.

**MISS THE**  
A pin could have been heard dropping on the wet turf when Doug Crippen went back to boot the point that would have given Medford a 13-all deadlock.

When the big Pelican forward waded through, Crippen buried his boot. The ball skidded off the side of his foot, barely clearing the grass—and the kids that wouldn't quit from KUHS had an incredible upset stamped in the Dial 6-A-1 books.

There was just time for a kick-off. Medford logically tried an on-side boot but the ball didn't travel far enough. It wouldn't have made any difference because the final gun boomed during the wild scramble.

The Pels scored both their touchdowns within four minutes early in the second quarter, both times capitalizing on costly Medford fumbles.

**NEITHER TEAM** could work up any steam in the first quarter but the game exploded in the second period.

Don Spinas, who duelled with Klamath's Ken Young for running honors, ironically enough handed the Pels their first break late in the first quarter and the Pels took advantage of the turning point.

Spinas fumbled and Doug Campbell recovered on Medford's 36-yard line. Despite a five-yard penalty on the Pels, scampers by Young of 11 and 4 yards gave Klamath a first down on Medford's 26 on the last play of the first frame.

**TO PASS**  
Quinowski legged it for three, then Pickett faded back and dumped the ball squarely into Quinowski's hands near the goal line. Chick went over standing up.

It was deceptive maneuver that had Jack Horton faking a catch on the 10 to pull in Medford's last two defenders. Quinowski slipped behind the secondary and gathered in the touchdown toss easily.

Young's kick—which subsequently proved the happy margin—was good.

No sooner had the fans stopped talking about that one, when Medford's guard Bob Walker fumbled a bad kickoff and Cal Gilmore was found at the bottom of the one-yard line, from where Jim Mahoney bucked over for a score.

**DiMaggio Intimates Quitting**

**NEW YORK, (AP)—**The question of whether Joe DiMaggio, whose spectacular career with the New York Yankees began 15 years ago, is going to retire, apparently was settled today—the Clipper had made up his mind to quit.

He declined to come right out and say he was finished, but he made it plain before heading for California by plane last night that he was delaying the inevitable only in deference to the wishes of Yank President Dan Topping, with whom he talked for two hours yesterday.

"I have made up my mind to retire and that is my present intention," said the great outfielder. "I have given it considerable thought."

When DiMaggio entered Topping's office for the confab, he was ready to lay his cards on the table. Topping listened to the slugger and instead of just saying, "OK, Joe, it's up to you," asked him to delay the decision for a time.

What it all adds up to is that DiMaggio has retired but not officially. The chances are that he will make a stick although he has changed his mind before.
