Foreign Damage Hikes Wheat

CHICAGO, (AP)—Private wires emphasizing damage to the upcoming wheat crop in Argentina, plus the prospect of large sales of 80,000 tons next week, sent wheat prices spiraling upward on the board of trade today. Demand for the bread cereal became very aggressive on the advance.

Corn also showed some strength, although not as much as wheat. The rest of the market was firm. The buying movement came around mid-way in the session, prior to which the market had tended a little lower, particularly on soybeans and corn.

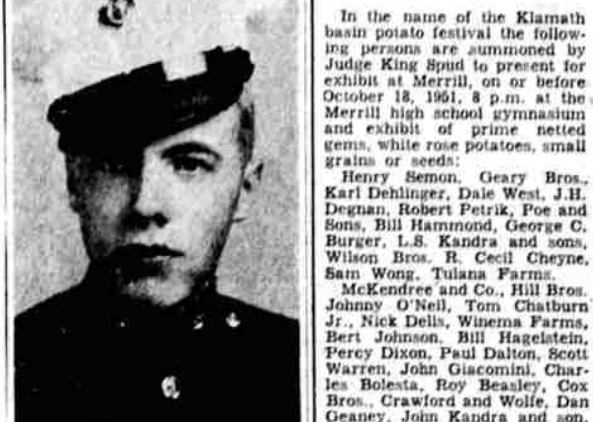
