RHEIN MAIN AIR BASE, Germany—An American troop carrier wing here, including Pfc Robert L. Steele, 3704 Cannon Ave., Klamath Falls, Ore., today is flexing its air arm in Exercise "Cirrus" as proof that it has become one of Gen. Eisenhower's notable threats to potential aggressors.

Less than a year after being called into federal service, these air reservists are a quarter of the way around the world working shoulder-to-shoulder with other NATO airmen in the giant air exercise designed to test the aerial defenses of Western Europe.

A visitor at Rhein Main air base near the junction of the Rhine and Main rivers, can watch silver C-119 "Flying Boxcars" of the 43rd troop carrier wing as they swoop over the field, then sweep in for landings at intervals of only one minute. The wing's demanding schedule makes this one of the busiest air bases in the world.

Fewer Farms Earn More

WASHINGTON, (AP)—There are fewer Oregon farms than there were five years ago, but they are larger and they earn more money.

There are more conveniences and less labor, more machinery and fewer animals.

The preliminary report from the 1950 census shows the average farm had increased from 312.9 acres in 1945 to 339.8 acres last year, and in value from \$11,054 to \$19,963.

The number of farms decreased from 63,125 five years ago to 59,827.

IMPROVED — The farm is a better place to live these days, the report indicated.

In 1945 there were 48,390 farms with electricity. Now there are 54,618. There are telephones on 30,104, compared with 25,643 five years ago. There are 50,037 with electric washing machines, 36,782 with electric water pumps and 30,468 with electric hot water heaters.

For working of the farm itself machinery has increased. There are 52,514 tractors. Five years ago there were only 28,646. Trucks have increased from 28,118 to 39,461.

The census showed there were 3589 farms raising cash grains, 1633 raising other field crops, 1267 vegetable farms, 4031 fruit and nut farms, 6655 dairy farms, 3277 poultry farms, and 6042 livestock farms.

There were 2196 that sold \$25,000 worth or more crops. Another \$534 sold from \$10,000 to \$25,000 worth. The total value of crops in the state reached \$298,079,076 (M) in 1949, compared with \$239,350,398 in 1944.

FEWER HORSES — The increased mechanization cut the number of horses from 108,267 to 72,012. Cattle also decreased slightly from 2,101,021 to 1,099,124. Pounds of milk sold dropped from 783,541,263 (M) to 748,302,071.

Hogs decreased from 194,116 to 157,237. Sheep decreased from 1,032,040 to 913,435. Chickens decreased from 3,900,735 to 2,842,740. Turkeys from 2,214,138 to 1,790,413.

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Women Hold Ballot Reins

LONDON, (AP)—Several hundred middle-aged men are desperately wooing more than 17 million Englishwomen.

It's votes they want, not kisses. Women outnumber their menfolk in almost every British constituency. Most of the "floating voters"—without definite political convictions—are supposed to be women.

So it's the women who are expected to decide in the Oct. 25 election whether Britain has a third try at socialism, or hands over the helm to Winston Churchill and the Tories.

The housewives and shopgirls have become the most powerful political force of the nation. They are the great prize for which the powerful Conservative and socialist political machines are competing.

Labor party Chairman Miss Alice Bacon began courting the housewives in the very first words of the socialist's election campaign—her opening address to the Labor rally at Scarborough.

"Never underestimate the importance of women," the result of this election is in the hands of women," she told assembled delegates.

Then she addressed the nation's housewives themselves: "I know the difficulties of housewives and mothers who have to cope with shopping and increased prices. But the Labor government has shielded us against the true effect on world prices."

The Conservative party is also directing much of its propaganda towards the housewife. It has asked candidates' wives to go into the homes and shopping centers to add the feminine touch to the 1951 battle of Britain.

Scrubbing busily at the sink and changing the baby's diapers, the housewives of Britain apparently are taking their new power easily.

Cruel Crook Gets Prison

KANSAS CITY, (AP)—A three year prison sentence and a stinging rebuke from a federal judge have been given a St. Joseph, Mo., man who pleaded guilty to using the mails to defraud. His scheme involved parents of servicemen killed in Korea.

Sentenced was William Charles Hollingsworth, 38, Sam O. Hargus, assistant U. S. attorney, said the scheme worked like this:

Hollingsworth bought copies of Chicago and Omaha newspapers at St. Joseph. From the newspapers he obtained the names of men killed in the Far East and the names and addresses of their parents.

He wrote the soldiers, in care of their parents, asking for money purportedly loaned to the servicemen.

The letter that brought Hollingsworth's arrest was addressed to John T. Green, Chicago.

"Dear Johnny," the letter read: "I've just got a 10-day leave. And I'm a little hard up. Could you let me have the \$100 I loaned you?"

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
