Oretechs At Full Strength

"All healthy, ready to go" is the report on the Oregon Tech footballers as they prepare this week for the invasion of the Centralia Junior college Trailblazers Friday night on Modoc Field.

The Owls came out of the Boise defeat with no serious injuries. The week's rest has Carl Dudley back in shape and the big veteran center will start against the "Blazers".

Jeff Lay, Albany guard, who played a whale of a game in the late-August prep Shrine game in Portland, will also see some action, the OTI brain trust announced.

Boise coaches described Oregon Tech as the "strongest team we have met this year" after winning 14-6 over the Owls.

That takes in Olympic Junior college, the only team to beat Boise this season.

Len Genetin scampered 75 yards to one touchdown that didn't count when the Ohio scabbard nudged his big toe over the sideline.

Centralia beat Oretech, 26-7, last year but don't boast as impressive a record this season.

Bears Run, Ducks Pass

LOS ANGELES, (U-P) — California boasts the strongest rushing game and Oregon the leading passing outfit in the Pacific Coast conference to date.

The unbeaten Bears have marched a net 1359 yards for a game average of 339.8, almost 100 yards per game better than the runner-up Washington Huskies.

Three-beaten Oregon has passed 797 yards in four games for an average of 199.3 a game, completing 50 of 118 attempts.

George Cummins, 222-pound sophomore guard, is a shot-putter on the Tulane track team. He placed second in the SEC track meet last year.

Dillon, Benners Top Backs

NEW YORK, (U-P) — A pair of aces from down Texas way took all the chips today as the best backs of the week in the Associated Press poll.

The winners were Fred Benners, Southern Methodist's one-man aerial offensive who passed for four touchdowns and 336 yards against Notre Dame, and Bobby Dillon of Texas, who made the key defensive play in the bitter Texas-Oklahoma battle.

As might be expected, Benners drew most of the praise in ballots sent in by sportswriters and broadcasters, but Dillon's heads up defensive play also was generously praised.

Although he's been filling the Southwest air with footballs for several seasons, Benners enjoyed his greatest day against the amazed Irish last Saturday. Unhurried and unruffled, Benners completed 22 out of 42 passes against a team that had prepared for a passing attack but could do nothing to stop it.

MAKES TACKLE

Dillon's performance was just as outstanding defensively as he provided the winning points in Texas' 9-7 win over Oklahoma. Safetyman Dillon came up fast to tackle sooner halfback Frank Silva in the end zone for a safety as Silva attempted to run out a wild back-pass from quarterback Eddie Crowder.

Dillon also returned two punts 39 yards, intercepted a pass and ran it back 16 yards and made several important tackles in the safety position.

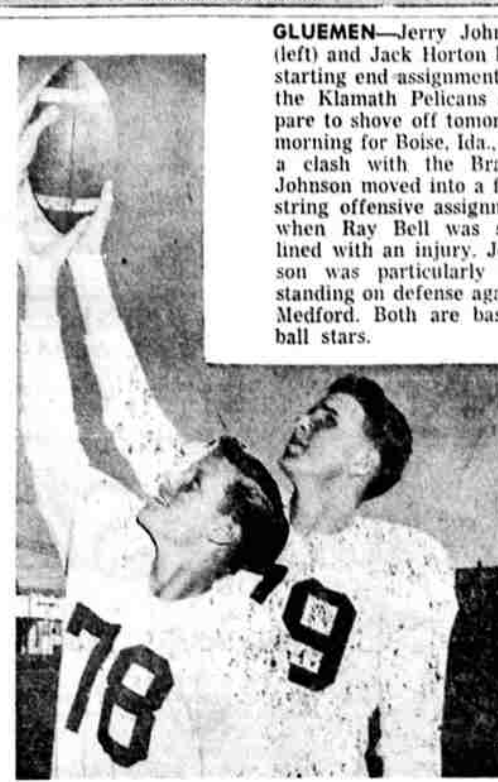

AP Names Bob Ward Week's Best Lineman

COLLEGE PARK, Md., (U-P) — All-America guard Bob Ward of Maryland modestly tried to sidetrack pre-season interviewers by talking about "my brother Al at Columbia who's going to be good, too."

Not quite as good as he, though. The 23-year-old Bob was voted Associated Press Lineman of the Week for leading Maryland in the 43-7 wreck of Georgia last Saturday.

Al, 20-year-old defensive end, was among those nominated for the same honor for his part in Columbia's 14-0 triumph over Yale the same day.

It's the first time in the Associated Press Lineman voting that brothers have been nominated for the same honor.

Besides his brother Al, Bob was chosen Lineman of the Week over 12 others, including All-Americans Les Richter, California guard, and Jim Weatherall, Oklahoma tackle. The other nominees were Aubrey Phillips, Texas Tech center, Ray Beck, Georgia Tech guard; Bill

McColl, Stanford end; Bill Howton, Rice end; Harley Sewell, Texas guard; Jim David, Colorado Aggies end; Carson Leach, Duck guard; Gene Offield, Hardin-Simmons end, and Gerry Audett, Columbia guard.
