

Stampede Set For Royalty

CALGARY, Sask., (P)—Princess Elizabeth and her sailor husband today entered the carefree, rollicking atmosphere of Calgary at stampede time—a special stampede just for them.

Their schedule here listed a brief stop at city hall, and then the wraps were off. A Chuckwagon luncheon (cowbelly and beef stew) and a baby stampede complete with bucking broncos, chuck wagon races, wild steers and scads of real, live Indians were on the five-hour program.

The only hitch was the weather. The forecast was for the same cold and snowflurries that marred the couple's visit to Regina yesterday. The day's high was expected to be 25.

But if Saskatchewan's weather was cold yesterday, the welcome for Princess Elizabeth and Philip certainly was not. Thousands stood for hours in a biting Northwest wind for the chance to see the royal visitors. Some children were so chilled they had to be given first aid.

Because of the cold, the princess wore for the first time since her arrival at Montreal the full-length mink coat which was her wedding present from the Canadian people. She kept it tightly buttoned through the outdoor part of her Regina visit, snuggling comfortable in the high, turned-up collar.

Swift Work Traps Youth

MIAMI, Fla., (P)—Harvey Melber Jr. will testify today that the law sometimes functions with incredible speed and across great distances.

Melber picked up a telephone in Miami Beach to call his parents in Ft. Devens, Mass., and set off a 3000-mile chain of signals that led to his arrest for mail theft before he completed the call.

Boston authorities, tipped that the call was being made, phoned Postal Inspector E. M. Dunlap in Miami. Dunlap traced Melber's call, found it was from a public phone in Miami Beach.

Dunlap was 15 miles from Melber, so he phoned Miami Beach police and asked them to make the arrest.

Before Melber had completed his call, a policeman was rapping on the door of the phone booth.

The 18-year-old Massachusetts youth was arraigned before U.S. Commissioner Roger Davis on a charge that he stole a mail pouch from the Mauch Chunk, Pa., railway station. He is being held on \$1000 bond.

Dunlap said Melber told him he opened all the letters in the pouch and got only \$2 for his trouble. He said he had come to Miami to spend the winter.

Wilson Rites Tomorrow

Foreign Aid Debate Today

WASHINGTON (P)—The senate today debates the \$8,025,126,000 (B) foreign aid bill from which its appropriation committee cut five percent in the amounts voted by the house.

Sen. McMahon (D-Conn.) and other administration senators said they were disturbed over this cut and would fight it.

Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) replied that any such effort would bring on "a major controversy" and probably lead to proposals for bigger reductions.

Knowland, who serves on the appropriations group, said many members would have preferred slicing 10 percent off the house bill.

He added that the committee had made a "modest" cut, particularly in view of the house rejection of a house-senate compromise tax boosting bill.

Conferees on the tax bill are making an attempt to get together on a new version, however. This and the foreign aid measure are the only major issues left before congress this year.

Democratic Leader McFarland (Ariz.) told the senate to prepare for a possible night session. It is

essential to get the foreign aid bill into conference with the house by tomorrow if there is to be a Saturday adjournment, he said. Pres. Truman asked for an \$8,500,000,000 (B) program in the current fiscal year but congress passed an authorization measure for only \$7,483,000,000 (B). The pending bill allots the money to carry out this authorization.

The senate bill carries \$7,308,401,000 (B) of new money as compared with \$7,482,527,790 (B) voted by the house. Both versions also reappropriate \$815,727,394 of unspent funds from the previous fiscal year.

The money would be used for military and economic aid to friendly governments all over the world. About four-fifths of it would be spent in Europe.

School to Get Keepsakes
