Solons Seek Atomic Info

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17 — Government officials have been asked to give the new session of congress a blueprint in January of a possible atomic weapons program by this country.

The senate-house atomic energy committee voted unanimously yesterday to ask the atomic energy commission and the defense department for a detailed report on how atomic weapons can be used most fully to assure national security. The committee requested a report by January 3.

Sen. McMahon (D-Conn.), committee chairman, originally had proposed that both the senate and house pass upon this resolution urging all-out atomic weapons production. Anticipating early adjournment he asked the joint committee to send the request directly to the two agencies.

The request asks a "precise program" for "maximizing the role of atomic energy in the defense of the United States."

The two agencies were asked to provide recommendations on costs, manpower and materials needed, and results of such an all-out atomic weapons program "upon other defense projects and the national economy as a whole."

WAR GUARD

McMahon said a swiftly expanded atomic program might avert a new world war. If war came anyway, he told reporters, "we would surely win it."

McMahon urged in a senate speech September 18 that atomic weapons be made the backbone of military armament. He said this country could mass produce atomic bombs until the "cost of a single bomb will become less than the cost of a single tank."

"That would be somewhere around \$40,000."

Six Rescued From Flames

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Oct. 17 — A three-week-old baby and five other children were lowered to safety from windows of a burning apartment house building yesterday as firemen battled flames in sub-freezing temperatures.

Some 30 persons were left homeless by the fire in a two-story unit of the Fairview Manor apartment house project occupied mostly by military men and their families.

INJURY

One woman was injured. Mrs. Mary Christian, about 50, was treated for shock after firemen rescued her from a smoke-filled room.

Firemen said a woman identified as Mrs. Hall tied a three-week-old baby in a sheet and lowered the infant to the ground. Two young children, aged 3 and 5, followed by the same route, then the woman slid down the sheet herself.

One air force officer, Capt. George Boynton, former Bellingham, Wash., Herald reporter recently recalled to active duty, arrived home from the Ladd air force base to find his apartment in flames and his family trapped inside.

Unable to enter the building through the dense smoke, he stood on the ground outside his apartment window and caught his two-year-old daughter, Stacy, who was dropped to him by his wife, Michale, while she leaned out of the smoke-filled apartment. Then she threw out a mattress and dropped to the ground unharmed.

TWO SAVED

Firemen said another Ladd air force officer, Capt. Delbert Smyth, saved two children by dropping them from a second-floor window into the arms of a Catholic priest. The fire apparently broke out in the basement and spread quickly up the staircase, firemen said.
