New Cancer Clue Found In Tests

BAR HARBOR, Me., (AP)—Another piece of the jigsaw puzzle of cancer fell into place yesterday at the Roscoe B. Jackson memorial laboratory, American headquarters for the study of heredity and cancer.

This new piece seemed to show one reason why some persons are less likely to get cancer than others.

Dr. G. D. Snell of this laboratory made the report in the journal of the national cancer institute. He has been grafting cancers from one mouse to another in mice. Sometimes the grafts grew and sometimes failed to grow.

The reason was traced to a single gene, a living molecule which governs heredity and among other things fixes the blood group of some mice. This one, like other gene molecules, is so small that thousands of them would be invisible.

There are thousands of different gene molecules, each ruling a different trait of heredity. Each living tissue cell has a complete complement of these genes.

The grafted cancers lived only in mice which had this particular gene. They would not live if that gene was absent. More amazing, it was discovered that this gene has five forms. For the grafted cancer to live, the mouse receiving it had to have exactly the right one of the five forms.

This means that every cell was able to protect itself against the grafted cancer unless it had the one susceptible gene.

The genes of mice and men are different and men have more of them. But in both men and mice the genes work in the same way.
