## U.S. Dollars To African Mines

BRUSSELS, (U.S.)—U.S. investors are showing great interest in the untapped mineral resources of French Equatorial Africa. American dollars have helped re-open several abandoned copper, zinc and lead mines.

Workers are recruited through a "labor airlift." Due to a labor shortage in the Middle Congo, 25 families are being flown in to the Mayumbe mountain area of the Middle Congo from Northern villages.

## Polio Mercy Flight Starts

HONOLULU, (U.S.)—A specially equipped military transport plane winged across the Pacific today, carrying a young mother with polio to her parents' home in Fresno.

Mrs. Mildred Button was in an iron lung adjoined to operate off the powerful generators of the huge plane. She was attended by an army doctor, two air force nurses and three iron lung technicians.

Mrs. Button, 23, can stay out of the lung only 90 seconds at a time. She cannot breathe in a portable lung.

The plane left Hickam air force base at 10:05 last night. Batteries kept the lung running until it was placed aboard the plane. Then the generators took over.

At Fresno, after another delicate switch in power supply, Mrs. Button will be taken to the Fresno polio clinic.

Mrs. Button's husband, Staff Sgt. Edgar C. Button, left Honolulu by plane Tuesday night with the couple's year-old daughter, Pamela. He will meet his wife's plane in Fresno.

The young mother was stricken early last month. Doctors said her condition was extremely critical. Button said he thought his wife's recovery would be hastened if she were near her family and knew that Pamela was being cared for by relatives.

## Sees Gabrielson Resigning

LOS ANGELES, (U.S.)—Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.) says he thinks the head of the national Republican committee will resign.

Capehart, here to address the California Manufacturers Assoc., was asked in an interview if he thought Guy Gabrielson should follow the example of William Boyle, Democratic party chairman. Boyle resigned recently after he was accused of influencing RFC loans.

"I think he should follow his own conscience, but my opinion is that Guy will resign," said Capehart. "I think Guy is an honorable fellow and while he simply inherited a situation, he won't do anything to harm the party or the country."

## Reds Refuse Peace Action

WASHINGTON, (U.S.)—Moscow has rebuffed a secret U. S. proposal that she act to bring about an armistice in Korea, offering instead to talk over the general causes of East-West tension.

Initial state department reaction was that this offer was propaganda, but the wording of the Russian note was such as to set off guessing among diplomats as to whether the Kremlin is sincere.

Moscow and the state department disclosed last night that Ambassador Alan G. Kirk on October 5 made the approach for Soviet intervention to end the deadlock between United Nations negotiators and the Communists.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky gave no direct reply, but he noted that Russia is "not a party to these negotiations."

He also: (1) Charged the U. N. command created the cease-fire stalemate with "all kinds of incidents;" (2) supported the North Korean-Chinese position regarding a truce line in the area of the 38th parallel; and (3) offered the Soviet's "full and energetic support" of measures for "the successful conclusion of negotiations"—successful presumably from the Red viewpoint.

Vishinsky also questioned the good faith of assurances from Kirk that the U. S. and its Western Allies are arming only for defense and have no "aggressive designs" on Russian or any nation.

Vishinsky commented tartly that "this sort of statement" is contradicted by actions "which show that the government of the USA is not at all concerned with the maintenance of peace."

## Workers OK Job Gamble

DETROIT, (U.S.)—A two-weeks pay "gamble" by 300 unionists and company officers put a 92-year-old plant back in operation here today.

The 300 union workers at the Hammond Standish Co., closed since August 14, agreed to return to work without pay for two weeks in an effort to get the firm back on its financial feet.

Company officers also have agreed to work without pay until the firm is making a profit. They will consult with a union committee on how the plant should be run.

Under the agreement worked out yesterday, the employees, members of the CIO packing house workers union, will work for three weeks. If the company is showing a profit then, they'll get their first weeks pay.

Wages for the second week will be paid at the end of the fourth week, etc. The agreement is to run for nine weeks, but may be terminated by mutual consent.

The packing company blamed its August closing on government controls, saying it was caught in a squeeze by ceilings on pork but no ceilings on live hogs. It asked a receivership and five years to pay its debts.

## Commie Horse Trader Jailed

BERLIN, (U.S.)—A horse trader landed a Soviet zone farmer in jail for a year today as a "threat" to the people's economy.

The Brandenburg newspaper Mierkische Union said the farmer brought two small pigs, a cow and his 30-year-old plow horse to West Berlin and swapped them for a young horse.

On his return he was arrested by the Communist police. The court ruled the farmer violated the law by taking livestock out of the East zone. But because he appeared to get the best of the deal, he "got off" with only a year's imprisonment, the paper said.

## Crossing Crash Kills Trucker

STOCKTON, (U.S.)—One man was killed and another injured in a train-truck collision on highway 99 near here today.

Highway patrolmen identified the dead man as Delbert Fogelquist, 39, Portland, driver of the truck. R. J. Scoggins, Portland, suffered a fractured jaw and other injuries.

Highway patrolmen said the truck was northbound with a load of oranges and grapes.
