ENJOY INEXPENSIVE PRIZE-WINNING ORANGE MARMALADE

It's Easy to Make Anytime with This Simple Recipe

- 6 Medium Sized Oranges (2 lbs. sliced)
- 6 Cups Water
- 1/4 Cup M.C.P. Lemon Juice (About 6 lemons)
- 1 Package (3 1/2-oz.) M.C.P. Jam and Jelly Pectin
- 2 1/2 Level Cups Sugar (Measured ready for use)

1. Cut oranges in car wheels with very sharp knife to make slices thin as possible. Discard the large flat peel ends. Sliced fruit should weigh 2 pounds.
2. Put sliced fruit in 8-quart kettle. Add the water and lemon juice.
3. Bring to a quick boil, boil gently for 1 hour (uncovered). If peel is not tender in 1 hour, boil until tender.
4. Measure the cooked material. Due to boiling, the volume will be reduced. Add water to make total peel and juice exactly 7 level cups.
5. Put back in kettle. Stir in M.C.P. Pectin; continue stirring and bring to a full boil.
6. Add sugar (previously measured). Stir gently until it has reached a full rolling boil, and BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire; skim and stir by turns for 5 minutes.
7. Pour into jars. If you use pint or quart jars, seal hot and invert jars on lids until Marmalade begins to set. Then, shake well and set jars upright. This keeps the peel evenly distributed throughout.

NOTE: This recipe works equally well with Navel Oranges or Valencia. When either variety is over-ripe and peel is soft, use 1/4 cup lemon juice instead of 1/4 cup. (Be sure to discard any seeds.) Recipe Orange Marmalade. (Cut out and keep this recipe.)

Ragweed's Spread Eyed

CORVALLIS, (U.P.) — Ragweed is spreading in Oregon and no one seems to know who should take the lead in stopping it.

That's what Oregon State college officials reported yesterday in telling of the presence of ragweed—the scourge of hay fever sufferers—in Josephine, Jackson, Lane and Marion counties. It earlier had been reported in Clackamas county.

The present infestation could be wiped out by cultivation and 2,4-D sprays within the next few years at an annual cost of some \$500 to \$10,000, weed experts at the college say. But each year of delay, they add, will make the cost much greater.

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New Code Slows Courts-Martial But May Give Servicemen Better Justice

WASHINGTON, (NEA) — The wheels of military justice have ground down to low gear. That's the biggest result to date of the uniform code of military justice adopted by the three services last spring. The code was written to give the men in uniform legal rights and protection nearer those enjoyed by civilians.

But today navy brigs all over the country are crowded to near overflowing. Additional procedures required by the new code have forced the service to put more than 1000 more lawyers into uniform. And it has added almost two months to the time it takes the army and air force to handle cases.

Spokesmen for all three services admit that it will be well into next year before they can tell whether or not the new code is really giving servicemen a better brand of justice.

The navy suffered the most drastic changes in procedure under the new code. And it appears to be having the most problems with it. Among other things it has forced a pre-trial investigation, roughly equivalent to a grand jury action, for each serious case. The army and air force already had this provision.

JAMMING

This accounts for some of the jamming up in brigs, according to Adm. George L. Russell, navy judge advocate general. As a result of his current investigation, however, he hopes to have navy brigs back down to normal population soon.

All three services have been forced to get more lawyers, because the code requires a serviceman to be defended by a lawyer and at least one lawyer to serve as a sort of judge on every court-martial.

The new appeal procedure, most revolutionary aspect of the uniform code, calls for the services of more attorneys. Every man convicted of a major military crime now has the privilege of asking for a law-

yer to represent him when his case is reviewed in the Pentagon. So far more than 60 percent of all men convicted since the code was adopted have requested such free representation. This has also contributed to the general log-jam of cases waiting to be reviewed and completed. Because of this confusion it is impossible to tell whether or not this privilege has reduced the sentences of convicted men.

Nor is there any result yet on the operation of the new court of military appeals, a newly-created sort of military supreme court made up of three full-time civilian judges. White House delay in making the appointments held up its organization.

The month and a half extra time in handling cases by the air force and army is accounted for by several new provisions of the code. A defendant now has to be notified in writing every time his case goes through a major stage of the new procedure.

Thus, if a man is in the guardhouse in Pearl Harbor convicted of theft, he has to wait for a letter to reach him from Washington telling him the results of the review. Then, because of another new provision, he has 30 days to decide whether he wants to make an appeal to the highest military tribunal.

PARALLEL

The navy is having the same experience with the new provision, which lets a man ask for up to 30 percent of enlisted men as members of the court which is trying him, as the army and air force have had. Practically no enlisted man wants other enlisted men helping to judge his guilt or innocence or helping to determine the seriousness of his crime.

Only 3.7 percent of the court-martialed men in the army have asked for enlisted members of the

court, and the figure is about half that for the air force. In the Korean area the figure is even less since enlisted men whose lives might be endangered by a fellow GI's crime would tend to be more emotional and severe in judgment of a combat zone offense than an officer.

code, feel it will be working soon. It just takes time to adapt new and accomplishing its goal of giving procedures and regulations, they say the men much better justice claim.

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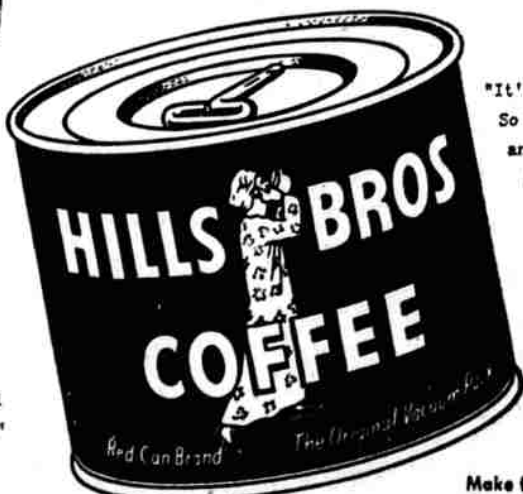
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
