Profit Taking Holds Grains

CHICAGO, (AP)—Soybean and wheat futures managed to overcome some profit taking sales today. They turned firm in late trading, with soybeans climbing more than 2 cents above the previous close at times.

Export news and continued poor Canadian harvesting weather were the main market props. Germany bought about five cargoes of wheat.

Wheat slumped again near the close to finish 1/4 to 1/2 lower, December \$2.94 1/2, corn was down 1/4 to 1/2, December \$1.78 1/2, oats were unchanged to 1/4 higher, December \$1.91 1/2, rye (new style) was 1/4 up to 1/2 down, December \$1.85 1/2, soybeans were 2 1/2 cents higher to 1/4 lower, November \$2.99 1/2, and lard was 10 to 18 cents a hundred pounds lower, October \$16.70.

Selling Pace Up, Stocks Down

NEW YORK, (AP)—with a pickup in speed the stock market moved lower today.

For the greater part of the session the market edged along a narrow range, but in the final hour selling quickened and prices slipped. The volume lagged behind behind floor transactions at one time.

Losses ran to a little more than two points in active areas. This slide was mostly fractional with a few outstanding exceptions.

Trading was in restricted volume for the third straight day and came to an estimated 1,600,000 shares. The total yesterday was 1,430,000 shares.

Bulls were helped by their request to the interstate commerce commission for higher freight rates.

Gains to more than 3 points were made by individually strong issues. Howe sound hit that peak after reporting profits for nine months equal to \$1.25 a share as compared with \$1.23 a year ago.

General Electric was under a fair amount of selling pressure. The company reported third quarter earnings equal to 54 cents a share as against \$1.23 a year ago.

Turman, Utah Appeal Denied

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The appeal of Turman and Utah Wilson to the U.S. supreme court has failed.

A court spokesman said yesterday that the court had decided against reviewing the case. The brothers are under death sentence in the state of Washington. They were convicted of kidnapping and killing Jo Ann Dewey, 18, at Vancouver, Wash., last year.

Attorneys for the Wilsons appealed the court last summer, and associate Justice Hugo Black signed a stay of execution August 17 to give the court time to consider the attorneys' appeal for a review. The attorneys asserted the Wilsons were deprived of their rights in the trial at Vancouver, Wash.

The Wilsons had been scheduled to die last August 20. The supreme court rejected the appeal with one word, "denied." No explanation was given.
