HST Names Ambassador To Vatican

WASHINGTON, (AP) — Pres. Truman today nominated Gen. Mark W. Clark to be the first United States ambassador to Vatican City.

The president's action, if approved, means the United States will have a full ranking ambassador at the Vatican for the first time in history.

Myron C. Taylor, New York financier, was a special representative of the president to the Vatican for several years, but resigned some time ago. He did not have regular ambassadorial status.

Since Taylor stepped out various Protestant church organizations have urged the president not to reappoint a special representative.

The president made no statement in connection with today's nomination, which came without advance public word of any such move.

Man Arrested In Mob Death

NEW YORK, (AP) — Police, acting on a woman's tip, disclosed today that they were holding an unidentified man for questioning in the slaying of gambler Willie Moretti, talkative senate crime committee witness.

They said the woman claimed to have driven the man and two others to Joe's restaurant in Cliffside, N.J., and that she saw them meet the gambler just before he was shot to death on October 4. Police are seeking the other two men.

The woman's identity was being guarded. She was reported in fear that gangland would take her life in reprisal for her talking.

Asst. Dist. Atty. Wilfred A. Waltemade said the woman telephoned him from a mid-town bar and grill yesterday and told him she had information concerning the underworld slaying.

He held her in conversation for 30 minutes and meanwhile dispatched a police detail to the bar.

Taken into custody for further questioning, she said one of the three men was staying in a mid-town hotel, Waltemade reported.

Police went to the hotel and picked up the man. He denied any complicity in the Moretti slaying under questioning by both New York and New Jersey authorities.

Boy's Burned, Women Held

ANAHIM, (AP) — Charged with burning the hands of three small boys who disobeyed them, two women overseers at a founding home awaited arraignment today in justice court.

While the three boys were under treatment for blisters on their wrists described by officers as the size of silver dollars, Orange county authorities began an investigation of the home, a religious institution known as "God's Orphanage."

Officers visited the establishment yesterday in response to a call from an employee who objected to the punishment he said was inflicted on the children.

Booked on felony charges of unjustly punishing a child were Mrs. Julia Elizabeth Ward, 46, and her secretary, Mrs. Carolyn W. Mungler, 25. Mrs. Ward is the wife of the Rev. T. Ward, head of the institution.

Basin Kidnap Figure Caught

A man identified as James Quentin Anderson, 31-year-old escapee from the Oregon state prison, has been arrested at Fallon, Nev., the FBI said today at Bozeman, Mont.

Anderson was wanted in Bozeman on a charge of kidnapping a girl, Joan Hutchinson.

He escaped from the Oregon prison May 18, 1951, while serving out a 10-year prison stretch for manslaughter from Klamath county. Anderson, member of the Klamath Indian tribe, lived near Beatty.

Percy Wyly, Montana-Idaho FBI chief, said Anderson and the girl were picked up after their car was involved in an auto accident which killed two persons near Fallon.

The girl, daughter of Mrs. Lola Hutchinson and granddaughter of Caudman R. E. Davis, disappeared August 24.

Prior to that time, Wyly said, Anderson had been working on the Davis ranch.

Anderson is now being held at Fallon for return to Bozeman. He was not hurt in the wreck, but the girl was slightly injured and hospitalized.

Anderson escaped from the Oregon prison May 18 by going out for a cup of coffee and failing to come back. He was a trusty, outside the wall.

Malin's Mariners Win Parade Prize

MERRILL—Honor of having the best float in this morning's Klamath Basin potato festival parade went to the Malin Mariners club, and prizes were handed out about a dozen other entries in the affair.

The parade was by far the largest of the 15-year history of the spud festival, and at noon today visitors to this community began tearing into 2700 pounds of beef prepared for the festival barbecue.

Malin's group of floats took top prize in the commercial section of the parade.

Other winners were:

Commercial — West Hitchcock first, Crater Lake machinery second, Walker Bros of Merrill third. Individual farm — Black and White ranch, Poe valley.

Organizations — Klamath Falls and Toketee Lions first, Merrill IOOF second, Tulelake FHA third.

Comic — The Inn, Tulelake, first with hula girls, yet; Merrill 7th grade second, Roger Trotman and Tommy O'Neil Merrill, third.

Pets — Don Willey of Merrill. Children's vehicles — David Hadley of Merrill.

John Colwell led the parade as marshal, and the line of march included the KLUIS and Henley high bands and various other marching units.

Merrill grange was first in the community exhibits, Malin chamber of commerce second, Bonanza FFA third and Tulelake fourth.

After yesterday's defeat in the top potato event by Central Oregon spud growers, the Merrill growers got back a measure of honor when the exhibit of Leo McKoen took top prize for netted gem certified seed potatoes. Paul Breithaupt of Klamath Falls was second, Chet Main, Tulelake, third.

The festival swung into high gear with last night's banquet. Three hundred guests heard John M. Swarthout, Oregon State college professor, present a thought provoking address, "These Disunited States," a "Compassion of Europe of today with the United States if a similar barrier of speech, currency, trade restrictions and suspicion existed here. He was introduced by Sen. Phil Hitchcock.

John Susac, state champion potato grower, Bend, was introduced by Mayor Frank E. Trotman, Merrill, and presented with the championship cup.

George Milne, festival manager emceed the program.

The royal robes and crown were placed on Queen Polly Haynes by Prof. Swarthout and the new monarch and her court were introduced and presented with gifts.

The turkey and baked salmon dinner was served by the ladies aid of the Merrill Presbyterian church.

Tulelake took a big slice of awards in the potato exhibits, cleaning the slate on white rose commercial and white rose certified seed. In the commercial division, first, second and third went to George E. Smith Jr., Chester J. Main and W. S. Edwards in that order.

Winners in the certified white rose seed division were W. S. Edwards, first; Chester J. Main, second, and McConnell and Blumenthal, third.

Hill Bros., Merrill, entered the least number of potatoes to weigh 100 pounds to take first honors, Klamath Falls, and third to Frank Hadley, Merrill. Hadley also took first on bakers. George Chinn, Klamath Falls, took second and Haskins & Co. Bonanza, took the third ribbon.

Yank Guns Blast Key Enemy City

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — American tanks smashed into Red-held Kumsong today and blasted Communist targets there for one hour.

They returned to the main United Nations line two miles south without a casualty despite heavy Red anti-tank and artillery fire.

A pooled dispatch said two companies of M-48 Patton tanks rumbled into the outskirts of the Red's central front bastion.

Earlier Saturday Allied tanks probed to within a mile of the city and pounded it with high explosives.

Allied officers said there were probably few—if any—Red troops in Kumsong.

"They have known we were on the way, so they have probably taken out their troops and as many supply stores as they could," one briefing officer said.

Saturday's central front battles were fought in rain and bitterly cold winds.

Area Combed For Boy Scout

WALLA WALLA, (AP) — One hundred volunteers pressed a search today for a 14-year-old boy missing in the snowy blue mountains after finding new evidence that the boy had left boy scout markers.

The Walla Walla high school student, Bobby Boatman, has been missing since Sunday morning.

Hopes of searchers were fanned by the finding of a trail of fresh gun wrappers and scout signs carrying the same "stop and help" meaning of previous signs found in the area.

The gun wrappers were of a brand the boy was known to be carrying. They were found in the narrow, steep box canyon on Butte creek south of Godman springs. The heavily timbered canyon eventually terminated at Troy.

Twenty-five penitentiary inmates who asked to help were among the searchers.

"This is the first real chance we've had to do something worthwhile," said one inmate.

"Run away," said another.

"Not a chance. We came up here to help with a job and we intend to see it through."

Forest service officials praised the work of the inmates.

Portland Fire Damage High

PORTLAND, (AP) — A \$150,000 fire ripped through the four-story postal building at 510 S. W. Third ave., in downtown Portland yesterday afternoon.

One fireman was injured, but not seriously, when struck in the head by a stream of water.

A woman, Mrs. Anita Emerson, was trapped on the third floor and was rescued by ladder.

Fire Marshal Miles Woodworth estimated at least \$40,000 worth of musical instruments were destroyed in the Portland Music Co. store located in the building.

Purse Snatch Loss \$200

A purse snatcher made off with \$200 early this morning on Owens street, according to Rose Curran of Sprague River.

The woman told police she was walking to town when a dark colored sedan, bearing Idaho license 2T-1385, stopped and asked if she wanted a ride.

As she started to get in the car, the woman said, the driver snatched her purse, and drove away.

There was \$200 in a billfold inside the purse, police were told.

Unknown Boy Held in LA

LOS ANGELES, (AP) — He is three years old and his name is Stanley. All else about him is a mystery.

On October 3 Stanley—his last name is not known—was left in the care of Mrs. Carrie M. Nation at her home in Bell Gardens by an unidentified woman who agreed to pay for the lad's keep.

But the woman left no name or address.

On October 10, Mrs. Nation was found dead in her bed, and Stanley was taken in by sympathetic county juvenile officers. Mrs. Nation had never told the boy's family name or where his parents lived.

The unidentified woman never returned.

Stanley's only possessions are a shirt and a pair of overalls. His only pal is a dog—likewise nameless.

STEPHEN FOSTER HONOR

WASHINGTON, (AP) — The senate has approved a resolution authorizing proclamation of January 13 as Stephen Foster memorial day in honor of the composer of folk songs. The resolution, which now goes to the White House, said the songs of Foster "belong to the people and are the musical essence of Democracy."

British Patrol Hit in Ambush

CAIRO, Egypt, (AP) — A British truck patrol was ambushed with automatic small weapons fire today in Port Said and another shooting incident occurred there near the Casino Palace hotel, the British Middle East command reported.

First announcements of the new outbreak against the British in the Egyptian capital of the British-held Suez canal zone did not mention casualties.

The British said their brigadier in Port Said presently is interviewing the Egyptian governor of Port Said on the shooting incidents.

Six persons were killed at Port Said last Tuesday in riotous by Egyptian demonstrators but relative calm had prevailed there since then.

Boy Charged With Murder

ALBANY, (AP) — A Linn county grand jury yesterday indicted Charles Raymond Shives, 15, Sweet Home, on a first degree murder charge. The indictment grew out of the Labor Day slaying of Herbert Ingram, 79-year-old recluse, at his isolated home near Lebanon.

A companion of Shives, Archie Vibbard, 13, has been turned over to a juvenile court.

In other grand jury action, Neil Sylvester and Shelley Littell of Crawfordsville, were indicted on a charge of involuntary manslaughter. Their indictments grew out of the death of William Page, Salem, and LeRoy Gile, Brownsville, last April. The two were killed when their car crashed into a parked logging truck owned by Sylvester and driven by Littell.
