## Wilson's Have One Hope Left

PORTLAND, (AP)—The U. S. supreme court decision against Turman and Utah Wilson left the brothers only one hope for their lives.

That will come if Gov. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington commutes their sentence. The brothers' attorneys, Irvin Goodman of Portland and Sanford Clement of Vancouver, Wash., expressed hope the governor would commute the sentence to life imprisonment.

"It is our firm conviction that Turman and Utah are absolutely innocent of the crime for which they are sentenced to die. They are the victims of a record, of the attitude of certain Vancouver police officers toward Turman since his release from prison (a prior sentence) and their conviction was based solely on circumstantial evidence and mere suspicion," a statement from the attorneys said.

The Wilsons were sentenced to be hanged at the Walla Walla state prison August 23, when Associate Justice Hugo Black of the U. S. supreme court ordered a stay.

A new execution date has not yet been set.

The Wilsons' attorneys said new

facts on the case are coming to light, and cited "the former sheriff's recent letter to Utah telling him in effect that he is innocent and should not be in the penitentiary."

The letter referred to was from ex-Sheriff Earl N. Anderson, who said he believed Utah Wilson guilty in some degree in the murder, but also believed a third man, possibly more, was involved in the crime. Anderson was sheriff at the time of the slaying.

The Wilsons asserted at their trial that they were in a movie at the time of the crime. Arrested in Sacramento, five days after the Dewey girl's body was found, they said they had fled there because they feared Vancouver police would attempt wrongly to pin it on Turman.

The state's most telling blow against the Wilson brothers' story was introduction of a beer bottle found at the place where the girl was seized. On it was Utah's fingerprint.

## Russ People Proud Of Their Bomb

MOSCOW, (AP)—The Russian people learned for the first time the other day that their country had exploded an atom bomb and reacted with considerable pride.

They talked about the news in loud voices as they walked along the streets on this cold, but sunny, day and formed long lines at newsstands to snap up papers.

The announcement, in the form of an interview with Prime Minister Stalin, appeared exclusively in Pravda. Apparently the editors had counted on huge sales for this edition and had printed enough copies to meet the demand.

**BROADCAST**  
 The Moscow radio began broadcasting it, however, just as the workers began to go to their jobs. A loud speaker seemed to be blaring in every house and each was clearly audible in the streets.

Western observers were much interested in Stalin's statement that only one type of bomb had been tested and that tests with "various calibers" will be made in the future.

They regarded this as a clear indication that the USSR has more than one type of atomic weapon and that she is experimenting with those she has in production and in planned production.

Release of the news found most of the diplomatic colony at the airport to say goodbye to U. S. Ambassador Alan Kirk who left today for home.

**QUESTION**  
 "Have you heard Stalin's statement?" was the inevitable question each asked.

Many of these diplomats speculated that the announcement might lead to another great power effort to work out international atomic control.

Some of them said that a quick reading of Stalin's statement led them to believe the generalissimo would welcome another approach at international agreement.

Some others took the pessimistic view that there was little new in the statement and as the previous Soviet position has already been rejected by the United Nations majority, there was little interest in anything happening now.

A few said it would at least be worth while to find out exactly what Stalin meant when he talked of "strict international control" of atomic energy.
