AMERICAN FEDERATION SOROPTIMIST

Three major service projects, international in importance, were approved by the executive board of directors, American federation of Soroptimist clubs, at a recent meeting at the Palmer House in Chicago, according to an announcement just received from L. Grace Nichols, president of the American federation of Soroptimist clubs.

Dr. Phiroza S. Davar, Bombay, India, a fellow in anatomy at the Women's Medical college, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania since 1948.

She was awarded a \$1000 teaching fellowship to continue research in public health and anatomy. This award was made from the general fund by the American federation of Soroptimist clubs as a gift. It is part of a program to support the Women's Medical college, adopted as a major service project of the American federation during the biennium of 1950-52.

The fourth annual international fellowship of \$3000 was awarded through UNESCO to Switzerland for special studies in social tensions. It will be given to a woman candidate (selected by UNESCO) who is outstanding in this field. This award will be made from the International fellowship fund of the American federation maintained by the annual contribution of "Birds of the World" by each Soroptimist club in the federation.

The sum of \$2600 was allotted for the rehabilitation of Promischoon Greece, one of two towns entirely destroyed during world war two. This donation will also be made through UNESCO and the American federation will join with the European federation of Soroptimist clubs and the national union of Soroptimist clubs of the Netherlands in this project.

Emphasis will be placed on educational betterment of the community and direct aid to underprivileged children. The new UNESCO coupon plan for specific projects was also endorsed by the executive board, which went on record to bypass unwanted equipment not applicable to local conditions.

In addition to sponsoring these three projects, the executive board voted active support of the high participation in civil defense programs as a major service project of the American federation during

the present biennium, requesting all Soroptimists to give full support as individual members, clubs and regions.

Final plans for the 12th biennial convention at Washington D.C. in 1952 and for participation in the Soroptimist International convention at Copenhagen, Denmark in August 1952 were also made. Date of the Washington convention was set for July 20 through July 25 at the Hotel Statler.

Theme of the Soroptimist International convention will be "Moulding the Future" and work of this convention will be key-note to bettering living conditions of children throughout the world. Special assignment of the American federation of Soroptimist clubs will be the work with and aid to handicapped children. The Soroptimist federation of Great Britain and Ireland will report on research into juvenile delinquency and the Soroptimist federation of continental Europe will report on care of illegitimate children.

Background — Dr. Phiroza S. Davar, winner of \$1000 fellowship of American federation of Soroptimist clubs for research at Women's Medical college, Philadelphia, Dr. Phiroza S. Davar was born in Bombay, India. She attended Wilson college, Bombay, for undergraduate work (1932-1934).

She studied at Grant Medical college, Bombay, (1934-38) where she received her M.B. and P.D. degrees. She was house surgeon in general surgery for one year and house surgeon in obstetrics for one year in hospitals in Bombay.

In 1942, she was commissioned as captain in the Indian army, the first woman to be so commissioned and served in this post for the next five years (to 1947). She then became demonstrator of anatomy at Grant Medical college, Bombay, where she remained until 1949.

In October, 1948, she came to the United States as a fellow in anatomy to study at the Women's Medical college, Philadelphia. She has pursued her work there successfully since that time, taking additional courses at Jefferson Medical college to supplement her training. She is working towards a Ph.D. in this country. Research work for her dissertation is being
