

Henley, Malin Wait Crucial

Hornets Stage Furious Rally To Shade Chiloquin, 32 to 24

The stage is set now for a Klamath county class B football showdown November 3 between the Henley Hornets and the Malin Mustangs—but the Hornets are still shaking in their cleats after the scare Chiloquin handed them Saturday.

It took a tremendous fourth-quarter rally by Henley to tuck away a 32-24 win over the Panthers.

The Hornet victory gave the Hornets a 4-0 record in county gridiron, the same mark enjoyed by the Mustangs.

The blue-chip hassle is scheduled for November 3 on the Henley turf.

When the Hornets raced downfield 67 yards on the opening kickoff and quarterback John Lehto capped the march with a two-yard touchdown sneak, it looked like Henley was off to the races.

But when the point-after-touchdown kick was blocked, Chiloquin's Floyd Hescocok tied the score in the first frame with a 40-yard tally scamper.

Then, in the second quarter, Hescocok ran and passed the Panthers to an 18-6 halftime lead.

Hescocok fired a pass to Gene Gentry to culminate a 40-yard touchdown drive, then took off again on a 30-yard pay-off cruise after Chiloquin had blocked a Henley punt—and it looked like the Panthers would write the season's biggest upset in the books, holding a juicy 18-6 halftime lead.

But Henley bounced back in the third quarter, recovered a Chiloquin fumble on the kickoff and Gordon Ramsey squirted over the goal after a 35-yard drive. That put the Hornets just one touchdown behind, 12-18, after the kick was blocked.

But Hescocok wasn't through yet. He warmed up his pitching arm again, picked out Scott Hartley for a touchdown throw to put the Panthers 24-12 up after the conversion failed.

Cecil Enman set up Henley's third-quarter score with a long gallop to Chiloquin's 15. But Mack scored a few plays later from the three. Lehto fired to Don Anderson for the extra point and Henley was on the short end of a 24-19 score going into the fourth chapter.

The Panthers got off a bad boot late in the fourth period and Lehto cashed in on a 35-yard march with another one-yard sneak. That gave Henley a squeaky 25-24 lead with just four minutes left.

Chiloquin started to march, ripped off three first downs. Then, with 24 seconds left, Lehto raced in to intercept a Chiloquin pass and sped 55 yards to paydirt. Mack's kick was good—and Henley held a hard-earned 32-24 victory.

Henley meets Rogue River Saturday on the Hornet field in a non-league game with the Dist. 5 team that lost to Phoenix for the Jackson county title.

Malin warms up with the Klamath Wildcats Friday, 1 p.m., at Malin.

The Henley-Malin game will decide the championship. Phoenix, meanwhile, is waiting to play the winner for the Dist. 5-B title.

That game, probably November 9, will send the winner into the state quarter-finals.

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Troy Charged With 'Getting Olszewski'

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Southern California's Trojans unloaded top candidates for both back and line-man of the week in their smashing 21-14 upset of California, the nation's No. 1 college football team in last week's AP poll.

Trojan Pat Cannamela, 263-pound guard-linebacker from New London, Conn., outshone California's All-America Les Richter in the same position Saturday. And one of his smashing tackles brought charges of unnecessary roughness that quickly were denied.

SPARKS TROJANS
Frank Gifford, 196-pound tailback from Bakersfield, Calif., sparked Southern Cal from a 0-14 halftime deficit to a well-earned victory.

The 21-year-old, 6 feet-1 senior, broke loose for an amazing 69-yard touchdown run in the third

quarter. In the fourth, trapped on an end sweep, he dodged two bears and fired a short pass to quarter-back Dean Schneider on the goal line. Then he kicked the tying point. And he figured in the victory score, then added his third conversion.

Altogether, Gifford personally accounted for 222 yards, like this: 135 rushing, 49 passing, 15 receiving passes, and 23 returning kicks.

Canny Cannamela, a stocky 5 feet-10, was everywhere. He didn't charge blindly. He carefully sized up each play—then moved, always in the right direction.

His terrific play aroused some sports writers to charge the Trojans deliberately "got" Cal's backfield ace, John Olszewski.

LAME ANKLE
Johnny Olszewski, who totaled 269 yards against Washington State a week earlier—went out early with a lame ankle. Some fans and writers charged the ankle was twisted deliberately. Olszewski came back briefly in the second period. He tried again in the second half. He raced 26 yards—then went out with torn knee ligaments after a Cannamela tackle.

Olszewski himself said "that Cannamela was a tremendous player." Cal Coach Pappy Wrayford, said: "It didn't get to the point of being dirty, although it was close to the border line because of some tackles out of bounds."

Prescott Sullivan and Bob Trishman of the Examiner and Will Connolly of the Chronicle all agreed "Olszewski was jobbed."

CLEAN TACKLE
Jack MacDonald and Roy Cummings of the Call-Bulletin both wrote that Johnny O was the victim of a clean tackle.

Southern Cal was penalized twice for unnecessary roughness. Southern Cal's Coach Jess Hill commented: "Olszewski was hit very hard and very cleanly."

It's not certain whether Johnny O is out for one week or the season.

Sox Name Boudreau Manager

BOSTON, (AP)—The Red Sox appointed a new manager today—Lou Boudreau, who for so many American league seasons was a nuisance to the Boston team Boudreau, who joined the Sox last spring after his release as Cleveland manager, succeeds Steve O'Neill for whom he once played.

Boudreau, now 34 years old, was signed to a two-year contract.

O'Neill, who was a coach at Cleveland when Boudreau led the Indians to the world championship in 1948, will continue in the Sox organization's farm system, it was announced.
