Benny's Maxwell to Make Bow on Television Screen

HOLLYWOOD, (NEA) — Exclusively Yours: Jack Benny, moving into TV with six shows this season instead of the previously announced four, will unveil his famous wheezing Maxwell on his first west-to-east live telecast Nov. 4.

But the veteran prop's days are numbered, Jack whispered to me, and he's thinking about trading the old car in—steady yourself—on a 1952 Cadillac.

Claims Jack: "I can get just as many laughs keeping it polished and worrying about scratches."

Jack plays himself in a three-minute bit in Betty Hutton's "Somebody Loves Me," the film biography of Blossom Seeley. Introducing Blossom to a 1921 vaudeville audience, he says: "You know, I just celebrated my 39th birthday."

Producers George Seaton and William Perlberg paid Jack \$55 for the one-day job with the comic quipping: "I kept blowing my lines trying to stretch it into two days and \$10."

Jack's TV blueprints for himself: "If the dialog's funny, you don't have to get involved in too much action. I'm going to do lots of monologues." Then he wailed: "It's going to be tough. I'm the only comedian who has always remained in character. Now I can never step out of it. Even on TV I have to stay in character."

GENERATOR BIDS

PORTLAND, (P)—A British company yesterday submitted the low bid of \$2,226,030 for three power generators for Lookout Point dam in the Willamette valley project. But the firm, English Electric Co. of Stafford, may not get the contract. The corps of engineers reported that the British firm said it would not be able to complete installation of the generators until nine months after the specified completion date, November 1, 1954. The next lowest bid, submitted by the General Electric Co.'s Portland office, was \$66,733 higher. But GE would be able to meet the completion date.

Escapee Kills Officer, Dies

PETERSBURG, Va. (P)—A badly wounded mental institution escapee, shotgun still cradled in his arms, was killed late yesterday by a fusillade of bullets that ended a seven-hour gun battle in which a state police investigator was killed and six other persons were hurt.

Police shot Herbert Johnson, 37-year-old Negro, after storming an unoccupied two-story farm house in which he had taken refuge following his flight from the nearby Central State hospital.

Johnson had one shell left in his gun and was still on his feet when 10 officers ended the siege by moving in under clouds of tear gas and a withering barrage of covering fire from an armored car circling the building.

The officers, on the lower floor, spotted Johnson upstairs through

holes made by fire from their riot guns. Two of them fired. Johnson fell.

Investigator Wallace M. Simpson, 32, was killed by a shot from the window as he tried to rush the house. Two other officers were wounded slightly as they tried to recover Simpson's body.

Also wounded during the siege, in which Johnson held off some 25 officers, were two patients and two hospital employees.

Johnson, a patient at the hospital about six years but not regarded as a mental case with criminal tendencies, had been under treatment in a ward. He recently was allowed to dig potatoes on the prison farm.

Angered yesterday morning when he saw seven details working in the dormitory, Johnson fled. Then he holed up in the house.
