The group met October 16th at the home of Mrs. Donald Cassiday, 2160 Garden with Mrs. M. K. Lowell, co-hostess.

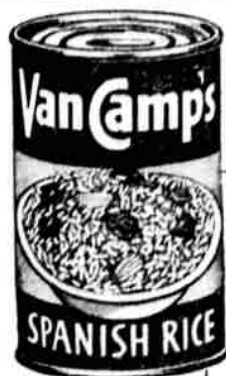
Women of the church will sponsor a rummage sale November 2, place to be announced later. Refreshments were served.

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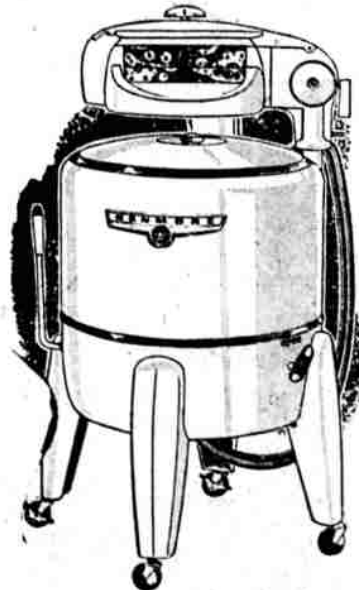
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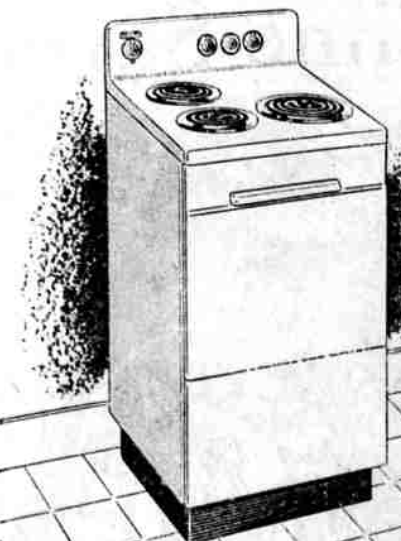


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
