Huge Fortune For Humanity

RENO, (P)—Max C. Fleischmann left his huge fortune to humanity when he took his life at Santa Barbara, Calif., last week. The fortune—estimated by friends at more than \$50,000,000—will go almost entirely into the Max C. Fleischmann Foundation of Nevada, the state in which he lived most of the past 15 years. Established last March, the foundation will be administered by his widow, Sarah, and five other trustees. All of the money, he stipulated, must be used within 20 years after Mrs. Fleischmann's death for furthering "the public welfare... or well-being of mankind."

Heir to a vast yeast and distillery fortune, Fleischmann shot himself after he learned he was incurably ill with cancer.

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Crew Finds No Wreckage

Snow and rocks were all that was visible yesterday as members of a search crew worked its way to remote Wastina butte, 80 miles northeast of Klamath Falls, on the lookout for possible wreckage of a plane reported by a hunter.

The hunter, H. M. Pierson, a Eugene butcher, joined searchers from Klamath Falls early yesterday, but since he had been in the area, perhaps a half-foot of snow had fallen.

The search crew consisted of KASITU members George Wardell and Al Moccabee, Deputy Sheriff Joe Madrus and Ranger Lee Corbin of Silver Lake.

All attempts to locate the possible wreckage from the summit of Wastina butte were futile, according to Wardell. Snowfall, he said, made it difficult to tell whether a large boulder was what it was until close examination.

Snow covered boulders sometimes even looked like planes, Wardell reported.

If and when snow melts off the area, Wardell said the search would probably be taken up again.

TRAFFIC DEATH
PORTLAND, (P)—An automobile killed an 80-year-old pedestrian here Wednesday night. The victim was identified as William C. Irvine, Portland, the city's 32nd traffic fatality of the year.

Liquor Deaths Charge Made

ATLANTA, (P)—A former convict charged with murder in the death of 21 persons who died here after drinking poisoned liquor was identified last night as a mixer of deadly moonshine.

Solicitor Paul Webb of Fulton county said a north Georgia farmer told him he saw John R. (Fat) Hardy blend wood alcohol and well water at an abandoned farmhouse about 25 miles northeast of Atlanta.

The brew was made a few days before a wave of moonshine liquor deaths began sweeping Atlanta, Webb said the farmer related.

Webb said the farmer—52-year-old Luke Turner—told him last night that Hardy was aided by an unidentified Negro in mixing the

deadly stuff.

A few hours earlier the solicitor had filed murder charges against Hardy, a 360-pounder.

The huge one-time convict admitted he had peddled 90 gallons of a mixture of wood alcohol and water to Negro bootleggers here, Webb disclosed.

Hardy, 44, was found yesterday in an Atlanta hospital where he was being treated for a fractured arm suffered, he said, in a motor car accident. He was immediately placed under guard.

Since the wave of moonshine

deaths took its first toll Sunday night, 29 negroes and two white persons have died and 301 other victims have received hospital treatment.

At mid-week, two white men died of wood alcohol poisoning at near-by Winder, Ga., and a third was reported in critical condition. These deaths brought the total fatalities in the Atlanta area to 33.

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
