Grain, Soybean Futures Slump

CHICAGO, (AP) — Grain and soybean futures slumped today, with soybeans falling 4 cents a bushel at times to cancel yesterday's advance.

The lower New York stock market led to some selling in all pits. Wheat traders also sold on reports that there seems to be a pickup in wheat loan redemptions in the southwest. Farmers have been holding their wheat until the market was more liquid.

Some selling also represented weekend liquidation. Some traders who were long in the market were afraid to hold these contracts over the weekend, since a possible truce in Korea could cause a sudden price slump.

Wheat closed 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 cents lower than the previous finish. December \$2.53-2.53 1/2, corn was down 1/4 to 1 1/2, December \$1.78 1/2-1 1/2, oats were off 1/4 to 1/2, December 1.19 1/2, rye (new style) was unchanged to 1/4 lower, December \$1.95 1/2, soybeans were down 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 cents, November \$2.98 1/2, and land was 8 to 23 cents a hundred pounds lower, November \$14.77.

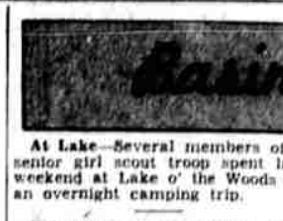

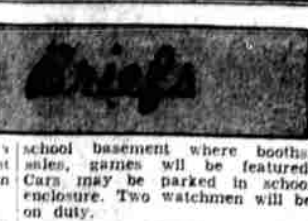
