Refreshments were served after the honoree opened her gifts. An appropriately decorated bassinet in pink and blue ribbons held the gifts.

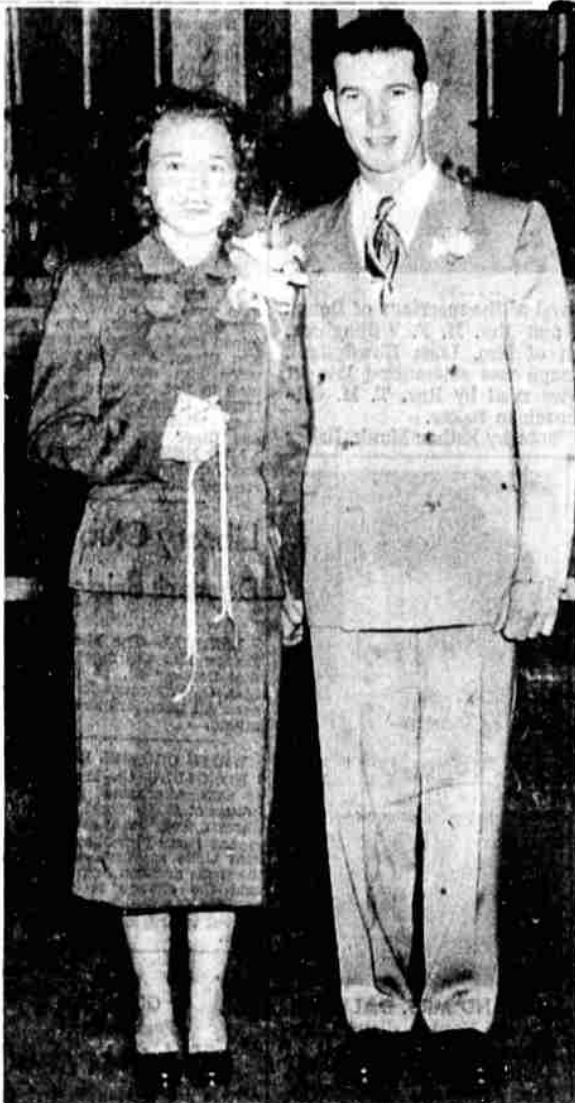
