## Liquor Price Increase Set

The price of liquor will go up approximately 26 cents a fifth in Oregon next Thursday as the recently-enacted increase in federal tax is passed along to the customer.

The increase is not quite as great as originally expected by the state liquor commission, and a new price list which set prices about 45 cents higher has been cancelled.

**NEW LIST**  
A revised price list is awaited by the two Klamath Falls stores. The tax amounts to \$1.50 a 100-proof gallon, so the increase will vary slightly from one type and brand of liquor to another.

Under the revised price list, bourbon, scotch and 100-proof items will go up 30 cents on the fifth; straight whiskey will be up 26 cents, blends up 24 to 27 cents; rum up 26 cents and gin 27 cents.

The price of beer will also go up, at least on the wholesale level.

**BREAKDOWN**  
The price hike from an added \$1 a barrel tax effective November 1. That breaks down to about seven cents on a case of 24 pint bottles, or a third of a cent a bottle.

Whether taverns now charging 25 cents a bottle for western beer and 30 cents for eastern beer will be able to add a penny a bottle to the price without violating price regulations has not been determined.

WASHINGTON, 28.—The defense department has identified 205 additional combat casualties in Korea. A new list reported 104 killed, 85 wounded, five missing in action and 12 injured in battle zone accidents.

## DA's Ignore Slots Info

PORTLAND, 28.—Oregon's district attorneys have been told where slot machines are located in their counties. But at least two of them don't intend to act on the information.

Atty. Gen. George Neuner said yesterday he got a list of slot machine locations from the federal government. The list was broken down and mailed to district attorneys with a request that action be taken.

But George Duke, Wheeler county district attorney, said "as far as I'm concerned, any action by me on the information in Neuner's letter will have to be on a signed complaint or on the option of the state police."

George Corey, Umatilla county district attorney, said "there will be no change in law enforcement in this county."

Neuner said Oregon law made possession of a slot machine a public nuisance.

## O'Daniel Eyes Oregon Ballot

PORTLAND, 28.—W. Lee O'Daniel, former U.S. senator from Texas, may become a Democratic candidate for president in the May Oregon primary election.

O'Daniel said, "The first thing I would do as president would be to write the king of England telling him the United States has just gone out of the money lending business."

O'Daniel said he stands for "repeal of all socialistic and communistic legislation enacted in the last 20 years" and reduction of government expenses by 50 percent.

O'Daniel, ex-governor of Texas, said he didn't really want the job.
