Stanford, USC Eye Bowl Trip

SAN FRANCISCO, (AP)—Stanford, team that apparently does not recognize the word "defeat," has become the headliner of the far Western football show—at least for this week.

The amazing Indians, taking the prediction of their boyish coach, Chuck Taylor, for granted, upset Washington, 14-7, last week to emerge stronger than ever as contenders for the conference championship and a ride to the Rose Bowl.

Six trips to the winner's circle and not a defeat is the Stanford record. And for the sixth time, Coach Taylor's pre-game forecast of "we'll win this one" has been correct.

Taylor, Stanford's All America guard of 1942, is well on his way to becoming "Coach of the Year," in his first season as head man. His "boys" have become men in the world of football. They opened the season in halting fashion, with a shaky 27-20 win over Oregon. Slowly but surely they have gained

stature with victories over San Jose State, Michigan, UCLA, Santa Clara and now Washington.

The win over Washington was decisive. The passing of Gary Kerker, the catching of Bill McColl and the come-through line crunching of novice fullback Bob Mathias were factors in the outcome. McColl is Stanford's candidate for All America end honors. He looked the part better than ever last week.

OLYMPIC CHAMP

Mathias, the Olympic decathlon champion, will be helping his country in the world wide track and field competition next year.

Stanford gets another tough test this weekend against visiting Washington State. The WSC Cougars completely outclassed Oregon last Saturday. It was a 41-6 rout. Washington State has arrived as a gridiron power, no mistake about it. But defeats by USC and California makes its title chances only a slim mathematical possibility.

SHARES ROLE

Southern California, last week considered the prime Pacific Coast conference championship challenger, shares the role today with Stanford. The Trojans had to come from behind in the last few minutes with two touchdowns to beat Texas Christian 28-26. Conversations by Frank Gifford accounted for the margin of victory.

USC MEETS ARMY IN NEW YORK

California, meanwhile, bounced back into a victor's role last Saturday with a solid 35-14 setback to Oregon State. California meets the University of California at Los Angeles there this weekend. Oregon State goes to Seattle to take on Luckless Washington.

Idaho and Oregon battle it out in Eugene, each seeking to salvage something out of disappointing seasons. Oregon has won only one out of six games and Idaho two out of five.

Broken Jaw Case Studied

KANSAS CITY, (AP)—The next step in the case of Johnny Bright's broken jaw is up to Oklahoma A. and M. officials.

A special four-man fact finding committee of the Missouri Valley conference left it that way after an eight and a half hour meeting here yesterday.

Bright, Drake's great Negro quarterback, got his jaw broken in a football game with the Aggies at Stillwater Oct. 20. He played only seven minutes and 54 seconds and Drake's officials protested that Aggie tackle Wilbanks Smith, a heavyweight collegiate wrestler, did the damage intentionally.

Oklahoma A. and M., represented at the meeting by Athletic Director Henry Iba, head football coach J. B. Whitworth and faculty representative Dean C. H. McElroy, are to study Drake's report to the committee before making a reply.

Only Baylor's Tie Mars Record Of Top Ten in Touchdown Binge

NEW YORK, (AP)—It was Navy Day Saturday and one look at the college football scores was a strong reminder of the date. Princeton swamped Cornell, 53-15; Wisconsin washed over North Carolina, 41-0; Oklahoma drowned Colorado in touchdowns, 55-14 and Tennessee drydoaked poor little Tennessee Tech, 68-0. Then there were these scoring salvos: Michigan State 53 Pitt 20, Michigan 54 Minnesota 27, and Ohio State 47 Iowa 21.

The Southwest conference was the sole exception to the torrent of touchdowns. In the cattle country's key games, rebounding Texas halted Rice's vaunted air attack, 14-6, and Baylor scored twice in the last quarter to tie Texas A. & M. 21-21, and remain unbeaten.

Two last period touchdowns also figured in another Southwest conference school's game, but these were scored by Southern California, which edged Texas Christian, 28-26.

The USC-TCU extra point battle highlighted an inter-sectional program which was marked by the Southwest dropping three games while winning none. Besides the TCU game, Santa Clara, which had lost four out of five, won 21-12 over an Arkansas team on the letdown after last week's Texas victory, and Villanova had one touchdown too many for Houston, 33-27.

Otherwise there were few upsets, however, and the top ten teams in the Associated Press poll had a perfect record save for the tie played by Baylor. No. 7, Third-ranked Georgia Tech utilized a blocked punt for a touchdown, then added a safety for an 8-7 win over Vanderbilt. Illinois, No. 4, shut out Indiana, 21-0, on three touchdowns by Johnny Karras. Maryland, No. 5, trounced Louisiana State, 27-0, and California, No. 9, whipped Oregon State, 35-14.

Missed Kick Costly For New York Grids

NEW YORK, (AP)—A missed point after a touchdown, something seldom seen among the professionals, could prove mighty costly for the New York Giants in quest of the American conference title in the National football league.

The missed point came yesterday and permitted the Cleveland Browns to pass the Giants in the American conference standings as the National league champions won 14-13 for their fourth victory in five games. It was the Giant's first setback after winning three straight following a tie.

While Ray Poole missed the try for the extra point after the Giants' second touchdown, Lou (Toe) Groza converted twice for the Browns for the margin of victory.

The Chicago Bears took undisputed possession of first place in the National conference, beating Detroit's Lions 28-23. A game back of the Bears, tied for runner-up honors with 22-0 records, are Los Angeles, San Francisco and Green Bay.

The three-way deadlock came about when San Francisco walloped Los Angeles, 44-17, and Green Bay edged the winless New York Yanks, 29-27, on three last-quarter touchdowns and Fred Cone's field goal with only 11 seconds left to play.

The Washington Redskins edged Philadelphia, 27-23, to go into a tie with the Eagles for third place in the American conference. Pittsburgh defeated the Chicago Cardinals, 28-14, in the other American conference game.

Duck Season Opens Friday

PORTLAND, (AP)—Friday is the opening day of Oregon's 60-day goose and duck hunting season. Bag limit in Oregon is six ducks or geese. One wood duck may be included.

The goose bag limit: not more than two Canada geese or its subspecies; or two white-fronted geese; or three brant; or a mixed bag of one Canada goose or its subspecies and one white-fronted goose or one Canada goose or its subspecies and two brant; or one white-fronted goose and two brant.

Hunting will be permitted through December 31 from one hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset. Public shooting grounds will be in operation at Sautter Island, Summer Lake, Malheur and Warner Valley.

Unbeatens Number 30

NEW YORK, (AP)—The list of the nation's unbeaten, untied college football teams dwindled to 30 over the weekend.

The list includes seven of the top 10 teams in the Associated Press poll.

Top teams still on the select list include: 1-Tennessee; 2-Michigan State; 3-Georgia Tech; 4-Illinois; 5-Maryland; 7-Baylor; 8-Princeton.

Eight schools dropped out of the unbeaten list last Saturday and four others were tied.

Beaten were Northwestern, Cornell, Santa Barbara, Worcester, Bridgewater, Dayton, Beloit and Southern State. Tied were Baylor, Oregon College of Education, College of the Ozarks and Emory and Henry.

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
