TENNESSEE NATION'S TOP TEAM

SC Trojans Skid To Seventh; Bears 9th

NEW YORK, (AP)—Tennessee remained a solid choice as the No. 1 team in the country in the Associated Press fifth weekly football poll today.

The unbeaten Vols, who swamped Tennessee Tech last Saturday, 68-0, gathered 1213 points and 29 first-place votes from the sports writers and sportsmen across the nation.

Trailing in second place was Michigan State, which also was the runner-up last week. The Spartans collected 1141 points but had only 25 first-place votes. They defeated Pitt, 53-20, Saturday.

The rest of the first ten included Illinois, No. 3; Maryland, No. 4; Georgia Tech, No. 5; Princeton, No. 6; Southern California, No. 7; Baylor, No. 8; California, No. 9; and Wisconsin, No. 10.

The first six teams in the poll are among the nation's undefeated and untied eleven. Southern Cal, seventh, has been beaten once, while Baylor is unbeaten but has been tied.

ELEVENTH
Strangely Stanford of the Pacific Coast conference, with a 1-1 record, could do no better than eleventh. San Francisco, another team with an unblemished record—6-0—is No. 20.

Washington State, the only other coast conference team in the top 25, advanced from its 18th rating last week to No. 16. The Cougars defeated Oregon 41-6 last Saturday.

Washington, an all-conference week, failed to receive a single vote after losing 14-7 to Stanford.

Only one newcomer joined the first ten. That was Wisconsin which jumped to 10th from 14th after its 41-0 triumph over previously undefeated Northwestern. Texas, which scored a 14-6 victory over Rice, dropped out of the select circle, winding up in 12th place.

There was some shuffling inside the first ten, though Georgia Tech, which had been shut on the trail of both Tennessee and Michigan State, dropped to fifth. Southern California and Baylor also slipped one notch each.

As a reward for its starting 53-15 shellacking of Cornell, Princeton jumped from eighth to sixth. Illinois and Maryland also advanced in the rankings. They were, respectively, fourth and fifth last week.

Olympics To Los Angeles?
LOS ANGELES, (AP)—J. Sigfrid Edstrom, 81, president of the International Olympic committee, says Los Angeles' chance of holding the 1956 Olympic Games are slim.

The Swedish engineer visited John J. Garland, an American Olympic committee member, yesterday to discuss the Games to be held next year in Oslo and Helsinki.

He denied reports that Australia will have difficulty in reading for the Olympics in 1956. "Detroit wants the 1956 games too," he said. "You in America should get together and pick one city."

Interest throughout Europe has been stimulated, Edstrom reported, by Russia's decision to compete in the Games for the first time next year.

Heinrich Out For Season

SEATTLE, (AP)—All-American quarterback Don Heinrich is out of football the rest of the season. The University of Washington's athletic director, Harvey Cassill, announced today that Don's pre-season shoulder separation will keep him out of competition.

Heinrich has not played any this fall, but took workouts recently to test the ailing flipper which led the nation in passing last year. "After several abbreviated workouts during the past two weeks it is apparent to both Don and the physicians that his recovery has not come along as rapidly as hoped," Cassill said.

To avoid possibility of a second injury, Cassill said the school will not permit Heinrich to participate in any of the remaining four games.

Today's action leaves Heinrich with three possible courses for the future. As he has a full year of competition left, he could play for Washington again in 1952. Or he could accept a professional football offer. Or—the army could call him.

Roosevelt Clings To Second in AP Ballot

The Grants Pass Cavemen, picking up new support with each halting, pulled further out in front this week in the Associated Press high school football poll.

Grants Pass has been the No. 1 team since the first poll in September. But this in the first week that every sportswriter and sportscaster taking part gave the Southern Oregon power a first-place vote. Grants Pass got 17 votes and 170 points.

The next word received by Oregon Tech definitely cancelled the game. The Owls took the news with some disappointment inasmuch as this was figured to be the year for OreTech to register its first grid win over the Ashland school.

Last year the Raiders nipped the Owls, 19-12, in 1949 and 1948 SOCE scored overwhelming wins.
